
RHS Pupils Anticipate Experiences Abroad

Different from previous years, seniors are eligible, but for only the nine month program. Students accepted in Redfield are then required to fill out applications concerning themselves; languages, if any; a preference to the Northern or Southern Hemisphere and other references. In New York candidates are singled down to semifinalists, and approximately seven out of every ten will be sent abroad. Parents may contribute money to the cost, but this contribution is not required or necessary.

Joyce Goodwin traveled to Turkey in 1966 under the AFS program; and in 1969 Sandy Nuhsbaumer was selected for Ecuador and Perry Haaland, for Finland. All three were gone in the summer for a month. Also, each year RHS has a foreign exchange student from a different country.

Preparing For Selection Of College

Selection of a college or trade school is a most important decision to be made by the student seeking education beyond high school. The selection should be made only after the student in cooperation with his parents and counselors has made a careful study of the school to make sure that it meets his needs.

When narrowing the choice of colleges, a student should consider many things. Whether to attend a coeducational college, a church related or a tax-supported college, or a large or small school are a few items a student should consider. Will it be necessary to work while attenning college? One's career plans and academic ability should also be closely considered.

When the student has narrowed his selection to two or three schools, he will want to obtain their catalogs and study

them carefully with his counselor and parents.


College Days are held throughout South Dakota at various high schools. These days can be of great value to the high school student by bringing pre-admission college counselors to the high school. These people are well informed on the requirement for admission, on the various offerings and curricula of their schools, on the expense, the scholar-ships and the part time work opportunities. Redfield seniors will attend College Night in Aberdeen on November 2.

High school counselors are prepared to give their students some vocational guidance so that they will have a reasonable knowledge of what occupations and professions might be suitable to them. If the student has had some counseling and preparation before College Days are held, he will be prepared to go to the representatives of the schools that interest him and ask questions which will be helpful to him in making his choice of a school to attend.

Underclassmen should begin preparing now for their future profession. Redfield High School offers preparatory

courses in almost any field desired.


