

As state winner, Lynette will receive a \$100 Savings Bond and will be entered in national competition, where the top award is a \$1,000 scholarship. Lynette was selected as RHS's representative in the D.A.R. Good Citizen's Contest by her senior classmates and faculty, upon the basis of dependability, leadership, service, and patriotism. She was later named Spink County winner by the Captain Alexander Telford Chapter D.A.R. in Huron.



## Flandreau Indian School Hosts AFS Student

I arrived on Tuesday night, March 2, at Flandreau Indian There are 450 students School. coming from nine states and thirty-seven tribes. To be a student here, one must be one-fourth Indian. Most of them go back home only at Christmas and June.



My schedule is very easy. From the first to the fifth period I go from class to During class. the two last periods I go to Indian culture, where I try to learn a

little of their traditional crafts.

One evening I was invited by the Indian Club, which was having a dance. Everyone was in costume. Costumes vary from tribe to tribe. The design of the beadwork can be flowers or geometric. One girl lent me a costume made of buckskin. It is pretty heavy. I like their kind of music. At the beginning I had difficulties to feel it. It was so unusual, this mixed sounds of the drums and musicians' yelling of songs. Little by little I felt it and then my steps were natural. It was a great experience and lots BY MAURICETTE DUVARRY

of fun, these dances. The arms are not used, only the legs moved and the movement of the knees is difficult to catch.


This week, Yukio, Japanese AFS student, and I will present our own country to the student body by showing them slides and having questions. When we first met the Indian students, they are more shy than the white students but later, very friendly.

During two weeks, four senior boys or girls are going downtown to live in an apartment. They have to run the house, cooking, washing and ironing clothes! It seems to be a very successful experience. This off-campus experience gives them more responsibilities and more opportunities to be in contact with life.

At school the students have not only to keep their rooms clean but do details (dish washing, hall cleaning, help at the kitchen, cooking . . . ). If the work is not satisfactory, they get points and have to work fifteen minutes to make up one point.

The students can work for credit. A credit is equal to one hour of work and one dollar. You must have ten credits to have a ticket to go buy a pair of shoes.



RHS placed second behind Watertown in the Section I Tournament and placed 13th in the state classic, having Dave Albrecht and Keith Farmen as fourth place finishers.


The 1970-71 letterwinners were chosen by Coach Richard Strande. Mike Remillard, Russ Simon, Rod Rohlfs, Dave Albrecht, Mike Osborn, and Steve Thomas were the senior lettermen.

Juniors winning letters were Keith Farmen, Bruce Cartner, Dave Nelson, Gary Lambert, and Jesse Wright. Paul Patterson was the lone sophomore to win a letter, and Steve Jessen and George Hirsch were the freshmen letter winners.

Dave Albrecht led the RHS grapplers with a total of twelve pins and 96 points scored. Albrecht also had the best record, 24-2.

Redfield has a good future with eight lettermen and some fine reserve wrestlers returning next season. The team will be strong in the light weight division, but most of the heavier wrestlers are graduating. The coaches this season were Mr. Richard Strande, varsity, and Mr. Tony Lorenz, reserve coach. Both coaches were in their first year at the job.

# Cagers Drop Eagles In Sectional Finals


By virtue of their Section IV championship, the Golden Pheasants will travel to Sioux Falls this week to participate in the South Dakota State Class A Tournament. The Pheasants' first game will be played at 9:00 p.m., Thursday evening. They will be going against the Sioux Falls Washington Warriors, a top-ranked team in the state.

Washington has a tall team with much scoring potential. They are the champions of Section III, in which they beat the other Sioux Falls schools, Lincoln and O'Gorman. They have lost four games this season; most of these defeats were administered by Iowa teams. In a recent Class A poll, the Warriors were ranked second, while in the same poll the Pheasants were ranked eighth.

Play begins at Sioux Falls at 1:00 p.m. Thursday afternoon. Semifinals are held Friday evening, and the runner-up and championship games will be played Saturday night. Consolation rounds will take place Friday and Saturday afternoons. This is the first trip to a State tournament since 1942 for the Pheasants. In that year Redfield traveled to the State B classic and won the championship.

#### SECTIONAL

Mobridge and Aberdeen Central fell victims to the Pheasants as



Redfield won the Section IV championship for the first time. The wins pushed Redfield's season record to 19-3.

For the third time this season, Redfield defeated Mobridge; the score was 92-65. Robert Patterson led Redfield scorers with 24 points, with Dave Battey close behind with 21. Terry Newman added 15, while Chuck Welke and Dennis Lovett scored 11 and nine, respectively. The Pheasants shot 56% for the game. In rebounding,

Coach Lon Scriver felt the Pheasants played a good game and opened it up with their running, which he claimed was the difference in the game. He said RHS played steady ball, and that consistency was the key to the victory.

Redield defeated Rberdeen Central of the Eastern South Dakota Conference 67-60 in the championship game. Battey paced Redfield with 32 points, and Patterson put in 19. Newman and Welke had eight and four, respectively, and Lovett and Gallagher each had two.


In this game, Redfield had a shooting percentage of 47%. They also connected on 27 of 31 free throws, which was a key factor in the victory. Lovett again led in rebounds with 11, and Welke, Patterson, and Battey each had five.

Coach Scriver said the Central game was definitely not one of the Pheasants' better games. But, considering the pressure, he said, the team played as well as could be expected. He felt they came through when the pressure was greatest, which he claimed the mark of a championship team. He said the players deserved it, and that the championship has been long in coming; he added that he's looking forward to going to Sioux Falls this week.

Regular season play closed for the Golden Pheasants on a triumphant note. Redfield's cagers defeated the Sisseton Redmen 80-61 in a game at Redfield March 5. The victory was the ninth in a row for RHS, and the seventeenth in twenty games this season.

Dave Battey's 35 points led the Pheasants and gained for him the Northeast Conference scoring championship. Dennis Lovett took individual honors in rebounding by grabbing 13.


