Earth Week. A list of things individuals can do to lessen the pollution problem was given each student.

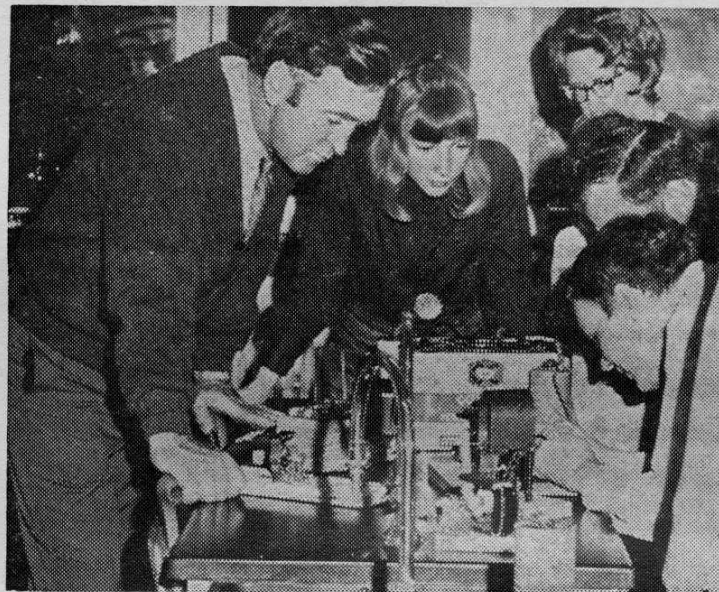
State Senator Harvey Wollman spoke to the RHS student body April 23. He described the pollution problem in the United States and gave some examples of how this could be solved.

Open House Draws Crowd

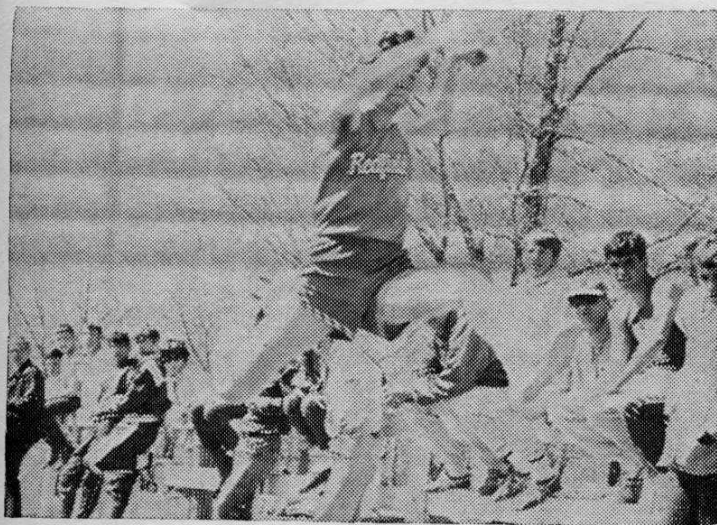
Open House, an annual event at the Redfield Public School, was held April 23. The event enabled students to display their work of the past school year for parents and friends to view.

Girls' Team Finishes First In Area Track Contest

Redfield's girls' track squad took first place at its meet held on May 3. Thirteen girls placed claiming a total of sixty-one points.

To start off, six girls placed in the field events. Dianne Knapp took fifth in the discus and Kay Waterman took fourth in the soft ball throw. In the long jump, Peggy Solheim claimed first with her jump of 15' 3" and Cindy Hansen took second. Lavone Opitz took first place in the high jump of 4' 7½" while Barb Aaker took fifth with her jump of 4' 3¼".

In the 100 yard dash, Lavone Opitz captured first place in 12.2 seconds, followed by Danon Flint and Cindy Hansen. Danon also took second in the 50 yard dash, and Peggy Solheim took fifth in the 220 dash.

Placing in the 80 yard hurdles, Lavone Opitz again came in first in 12.1 seconds and Janet Guenther second in 13.5 seconds. Janet also took second in the 100 meter hurdles.

Redfield's 440 relay team also took first place. Team members are Cindy Hansen, Danon Flint, Lavone Opitz, and Diane Strande. The 880- relay team placed fourth with team members Darlene Campbell, Peggy Solheim, Diane Strande, and Christy Pennington. Darlene and Christy with Jill Sorensen and Diann Determan are members of the medley team, which took fourth place.

ABERDEEN

Fifteen girls placed at the girls' track meet in Aberdeen on April 15. Redfield captured a total of 61 points for second place.

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This year's State Track and Field Meet will be held in Sioux Falls on May 21 and 22. Returnees from last year's state meet include Bob Roggenthen in the high jump, Dane Sanger in the two-mile run, and Dennis Lovett in both the high jump and broad jump. Lovett took third in the Class "AA" broad jump last year.

Dennis Lovett, Alan Johnson and Mario Hansen paved the way for the Pheasants. Lovett won the long jump and triple jump. He also took third in the high and low hurdles. Johnson won both hur-

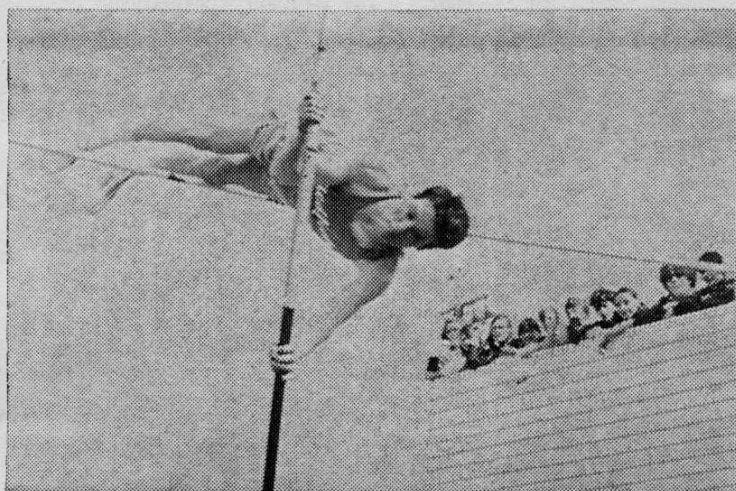
dles and took second in the pole vault. Hansen won the mile run and placed a close second in the 880 yard run.

With good team balance, Redfield placed in almost all individual events. Bog Roggenthen took second in the high jump. Scott Hicks leaped to a fourth place finish in the triple jump, and Ed Anderson placed fifth in the discus.

Redfield's relays also did well. Dean Jankord, Boschee, Patterson, and Roggenthen combined in the 880 yard relay in a tie for first. The Pheasants two mile and medley relays each placed second, and the mile relay took fifth.

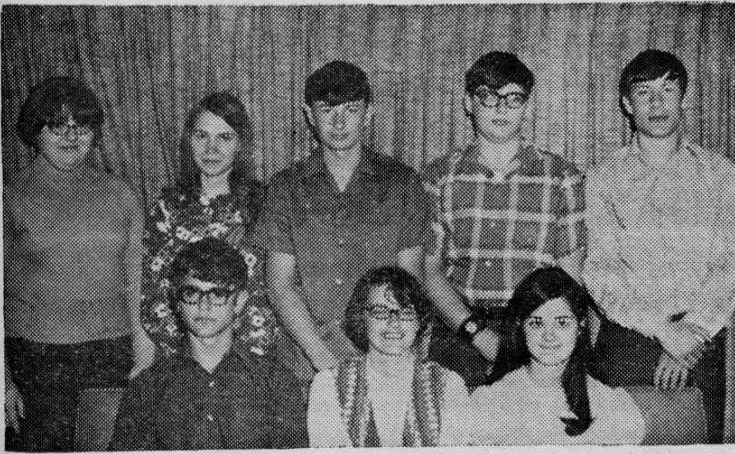

RHS Sweeps Big Four, Participates At Sisseton

Redfield continued its domination of the Big Four track and field meet on April 24 at Redfield. The Pheasants totaled 104 points to 85½ for Miller, 52½ for Westington Springs and 30 for Gettysburg.

Dennis Lovett and Bob Roggenthen carved their names in the record book for Redfield. Lovett leaped 41' 5" in the triple jump while Roggenthen cleared 5' 9½" in the high jump. Lovett also won the long jump, placed second in the high hurdles and third in the high jump.

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SISSETON

Redfield athletes turned in one of their finest performances of the year at the Sisseton Relays. The relays were held on April 30.

Dennis Lovett established two new meet and school records. The RHS senior leaped 21' 6" in the broad jump and soared 42' 11½" in the triple jump. The latter is the best recorded jump in the state so far this season.

Alan Johnson won the high hurdles in 15.9 and took second in the low hurdles. Lovett placed third and fourth in the highs and lows, respectively.

Redfield's 880 yard relay team picked up a first place trophy. Johnson, Boschee, Bob Patterson and Roggenthen composed the team.

The Pheasants also did well in the other relays. The 440 and med-

ley relay teams each placed second. The mile and two mile teams each took fourth.

Mario Hansen finished strong to win the mile run. Kevin Boschee sprinted to a third place finish in the 100 yard dash. Ed Anderson took third in the discus, and Bob Roggenthen placed fourth in the high jump.
