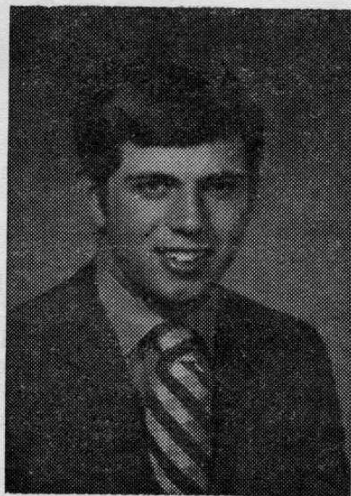


Top Honor Graduates

This is the last time I'm writing a column in the PHEASANT CALL. It is a time of sadness and happiness — sadness because it marks the end of this year in RHS and the community, and happiness because I'm going to see again my family and my country.

I have had a great year. So many souvenirs! The best memories will concern Homecoming, AFS picnic and weekend, Prom. I feel now at ease and relax among you and it is a good feeling.



Now I'll tell you some funny things about this year. It took me eight months to say the word "arrow" correctly, but I still have troubles with words such as Barbara, clothes, cloth. Especially the words with "th" and "r" sounds are difficult for me; these sounds do not exist in the French language.

I'm crazy about jello, but I hate French dressing. I never saw this dressing in France, and I do not like the mixing of salted and sugared foods.

I think I shall try to have a slumber-party when I shall be at home. This will be something new, tiring and fun.

I gave 32 speeches.

I tried my first popsicle last week, an orange one.

During this year I did a lot of things I never did before. I learned to appreciate new and different things. Sometimes I prefer the way you do things, especially about organization and some other times it is the contrary.

Now I have the feeling that I belong to the community; it takes quite a while. I do not consider you first as American citizens but as people. There are people before country.

I can't make any generalization about the American way of life. I can't know the United States by only one State. I can't build a right opinion through one family, one school, one community.

It takes time to understand, to accept, to admit. This year has given me the opportunity to know another culture. I hope you have learned a little more about France. Now I am interested in more things and want to learn more.

I have a lot of souvenirs, good ones and bad ones also.

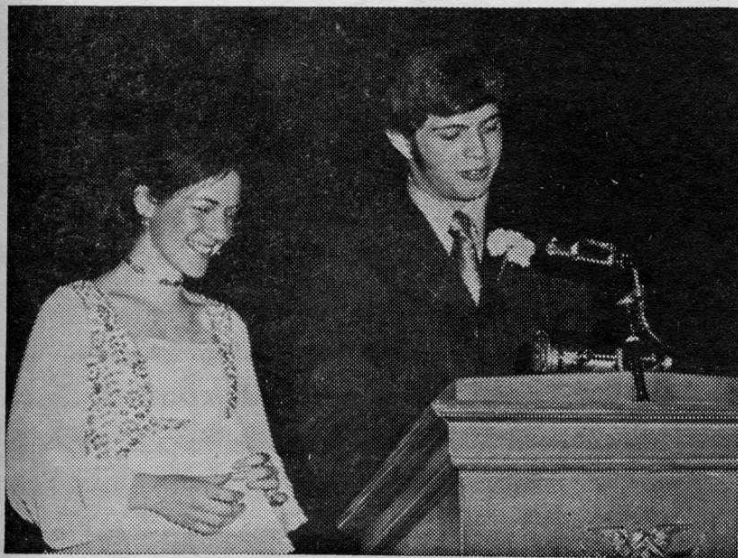

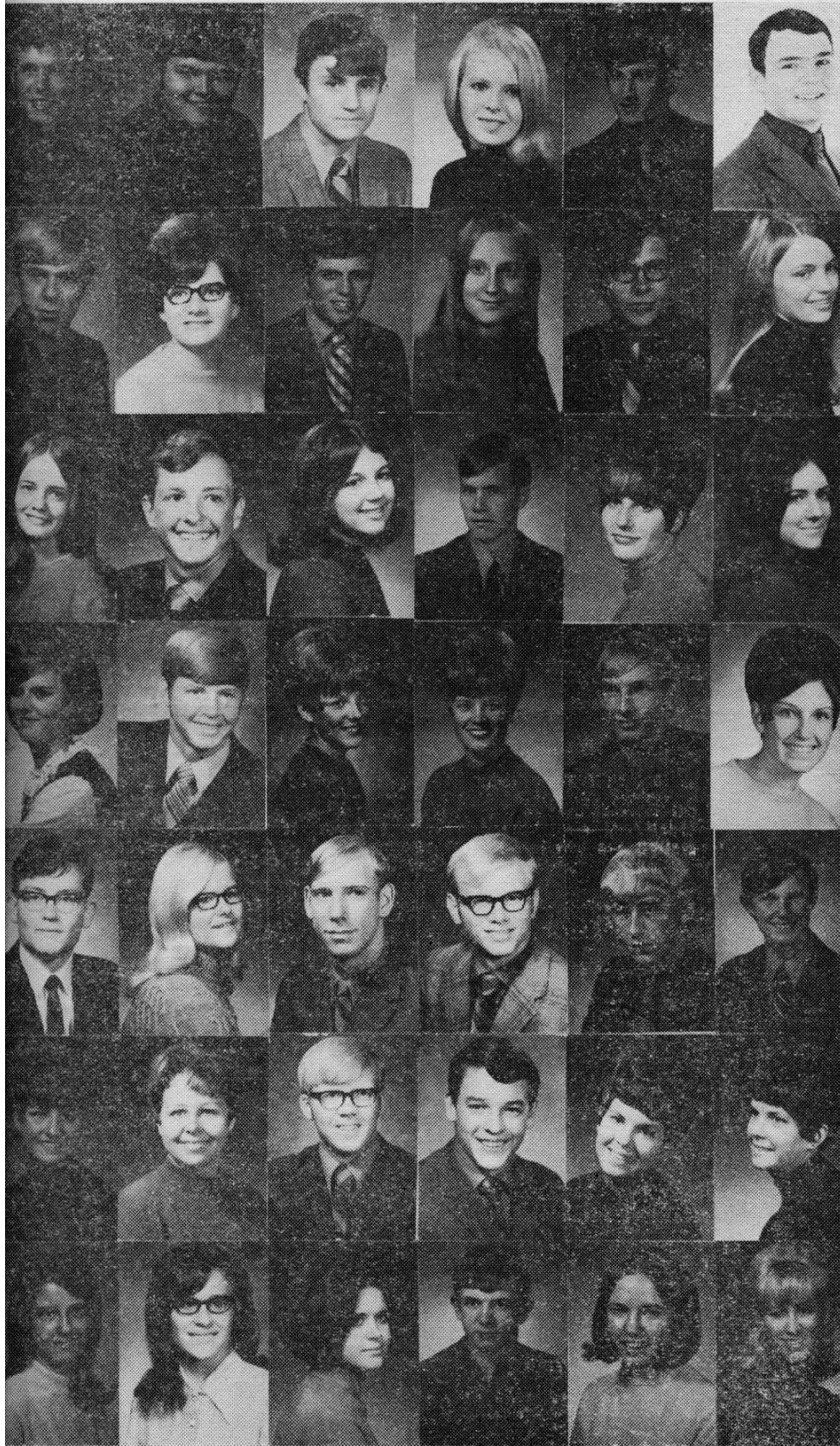
