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Merit Semi-finalists Compete For Prizes

Named as RHS's 1971 National Merit Scholarship semi-finalists have been Barb Aaker, Jane Bradley, Tom Gallagher, Debby Jones, Bill Kent, and Martha Perry. Only Sioux Falls Washington, with seven, surpassed RHS in the number of South Dakota finalists.

Selection of the winners of Merit Scholarships is based on a number of factors considered in combination — academic and leadership record, personal achievements and abilities, the Finalist's statements about himself, the school's characterization of him, and his test scores.

To qualify as a finalist, a semi-finalist must be endorsed by the school administration, take the SAT test in November in order to substantiate his National Merit scores, and supply the selection board with a description of his chief interests, activities, achievements, etc.

Semi-finalists who meet all standards will advance to Finalist standing and will be considered for Merit Scholarships by a selec-

tion committee of professionals in the field of college admissions and by participating sponsors. All Merit Scholars will be announced publicly in April or May of 1972.

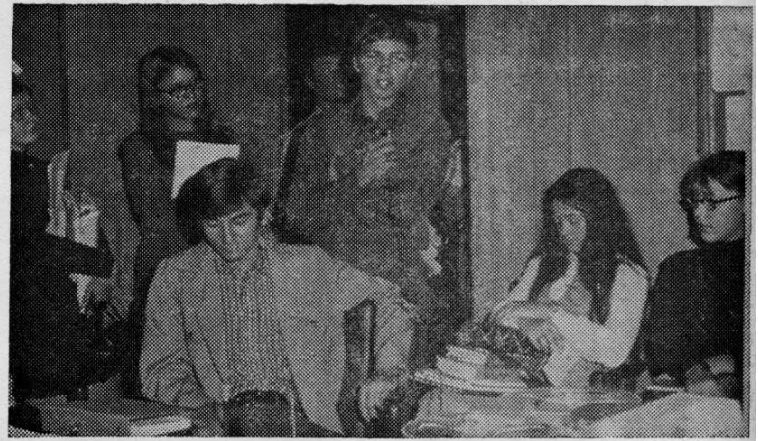

English Have Complex System

The school system at home is far more complicated than it is here. Here, as I expect you know, you start off in the first grade and carry on through to the twelfth grade without any worry except making the higher grade

the following year. After the twelfth grade you then think about a career and college.

At home we start school when we are five years old in what is called a primary school. These can be private schools, public or government assisted. The latter is a school where small fees are paid by the students or their parents, but the major part of the costs are paid by the government. We attend these primary schools until we are eleven.

Then we take an examination or are graded according to our work. These two occur only in areas where there is a dual secondary system. That is where there is a grammar school and a secondary modern. A grammar

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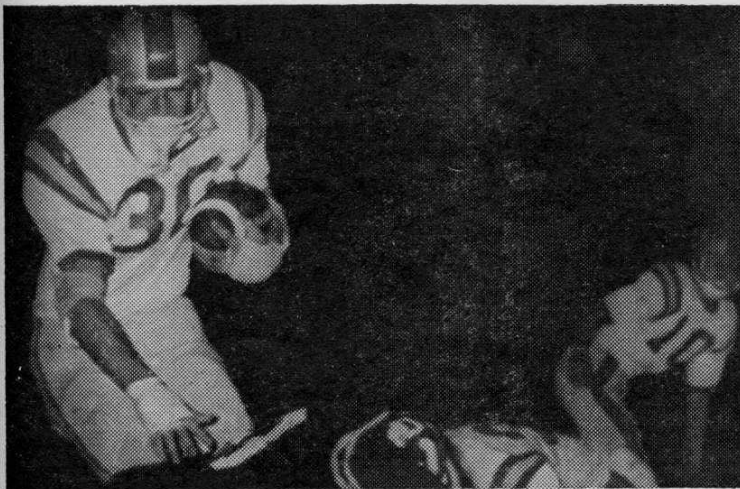

"B" Squad Gridders Stay Unbeaten, Conquer Springs, Huron Opponents

Redfield's "B" football team played a fine defensive game and defeated Wessington Springs 36-8 October 4. The game was played at Wessington Springs and extended the Chick's victory string to four.

Fullback Scott Hicks ran for a TD in the first quarter, and Steve Jones passed to Randy Bentz for the successful conversion. Wessington Springs later knotted the score, but the Chicks came back to score on a run by Rich Jankord. The PAT pass from Jones to Bentz was incomplete and the score at halftime stood at 14-8.

Redfield did not score again until early in the fourth quarter when Jones hit Jankord for a touchdown on a pass play which covered 60 yards. Dana Coats was successful on the conversion

kick. Hicks followed with another TD run and Coats again kicked the ball through the uprights. The Chicks scored the final touchdown of the game on a Jones to Jankord pass. Coats faked the kick and Jones passed to Steve Marlette in the endzone for the two point conversion. The Redfield offensive line was credited with an outstanding game.

HURON

RHS "B" squad defeated Huron 33-6 September 21. The game was played at Redfield.

The "B" squad accounted for all of their scoring through a good running game. Rich Jankord opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 33 yard romp around end,

and Steve Jones' successful conversion pass to Randy Bentz set the first quarter score at 8-0.

Jankord again scored on a run in the second quarter, although Dana Coats' place kick attempt was blocked. Huron scored late in the quarter, and the score at half was 14-6.

Scott Hicks romped 46 yards for a score in the third quarter, but a Jones to Marlette aerial fell incomplete on the conversion attempt.

Terry Kegler and Jankord provided the scoring punch for the Chicks in the fourth quarter as they raced 2 and 43 yards respectively for TD's. Coats was successful on one of two PAT kicks.

Varsity Makes Ready For Roncalli Clash

Upcoming games for the grid-ders will be with Roncalli on October 16, and with Webster October 22. The Roncalli game will be at Aberdeen and the Webster contest at Redfield.

Roncalli has a team composed mostly of sophomores and juniors, but are presently tied for second place in the Northeast Conference.

The Webster Bearcats have few returning lettermen, but will be out for revenge after last year's 16-0 defeat at the hands of Redfield. The Bearcats are currently tied for second place in the con-

ference and should provide the Pheasants with a real battle.

CLARK

Powerhouse Clark defeated Redfield's Pheasants 30-6 in a contest played at Redfield October 8. The loss dropped the Pheasant grid-ders' conference record to 2-2.

Redfield was shut out in the first half by a rough Comet defense, while Clark scored 14 points in the half on a run and a pass. Redfield's defense nullified two more excellent Clark scoring opportunities, one on an interception by Steve Raebel.

The Pheasants' lone tally came late in the third quarter. Defensive end Tim Day recovered a fumble on the Clark 42 yard line, and the Pheasants drove to the 24 yard line. Quarterback Denis Guenther then passed to Steve Raebel for the touchdown. The conversion pass was batted down. Clark then scored twice to achieve the final score of 30-6.

Clark's powerful ground game showed up in the final statistics as the Comets amassed 322 yards rushing. The only category in which the Pheasants bested the Comets was in passing, as Guenther completed four of nine passes for 49 yards, six more yards than Clark's total.

MILBANK

Milbank's Bulldogs defeated a hard-fighting Redfield Pheasant squad in a game played at Milbank October 1. The game dropped Redfield from the Northeast Conference undefeated ranks.

The game was surprisingly even except for scoring. The Pheasants led both in total yardage and first downs but were unable to tally more than six points.

Redfield's scoring play came in the first quarter on a six yard plunge by Robert Tiff. Denis Guenther's conversion pass fell incomplete, and at halftime the score stood at 6-6.

The Pheasants were unable to move the ball in the second half as the bigger Milbank team wore down the Pheasants.

Coach Rollie Nielson cited Russ Battey for a fine defensive effort and also stated that the Pheasant offensive backs ran well.

Tiff was the leading ground gainer for Redfield, compiling 153 yards on 29 carries. Quarterback Guenther managed to connect on four of 11 passes for 56 yards.

Redfield's cross country team attended Britton's invitational meet on September 26. Redfield won with point counters Don Zundel, who finished second, Bob Zundel, who captured third. Bob Severance, Mark Baus, and Dave Hansen also placed.

In a secondary modern the courses are aimed more at preparing the students for work by partial training. At both these schools a career for the future is thought about at least two years before the students leave, to give them a background of knowledge of that career.

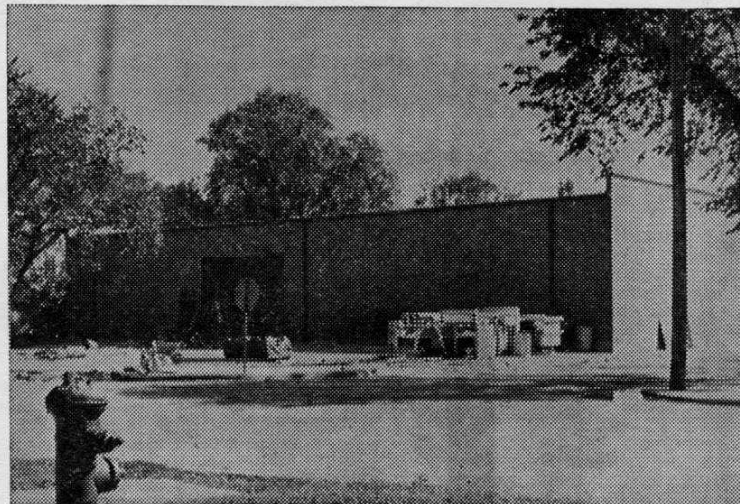
There are also technical colleges anyone can attend after they are sixteen; these, as the name implies, teach technical skills, but they also cover other courses which can qualify people for better or different trades. Mainly people from secondary school go to a technical college as they can gain qualifications nearly as good as those of a person who went to grammar school.

To go to university, another two years at a grammar school are required to gain higher qualifications and so greatly increase the chances of entry. In fact, most universities require these entire qualifications as a minimum for entry.
