The sponsors of the contest, the Daughters of the American Revolution trace their family trees to ancestors who fought in the Revolutionary War. Barb explained that DAR "strives for idealness in citizenship and patriotism."

Included in Barb's citizenship activities is a week at Girls State last June. There she served as city clerk and circuit court judge. She was also elected to the state Supreme Court.

Open Campus Proposed

Pass cards were initiated in RHS last year on a trial basis for the seniors, with the privilege being extended to the Junior Class for the last nine weeks. Another revision has given them to juniors for the second semester. Now that they are apparently here to stay, this system should be considered on its merits and hopefully changed accordingly.

A look at the purpose of pass cards would make this evaluation clearer. The system definitely provides an incentive for better grades, along with allowing its holders a chance to develop and exercise their responsibility with free time.

It would be desirable to see that as many students as possible receive these benefits. Obviously, any advantage that an upperclassman may receive can be achieved by the rest of the honor students, so let's make it available to them. There has been some talk of being an upperclass privilege, but we must be realistic and not selfish when it comes to extending pass cards. We shouldn't let class distinctions be a hindrance in achieving maximum results. Giving pass cards to the entire honor roll might provide worthwhile results.

Another change that shouldn't be overlooked is granting pass cards to everyone not failing a course. Once criticism of the present system is that it doesn't allow for inherent limitations of students academically, in other words, some students just can't get on the honor roll. In this sense, pass cards discriminate against those people. This would give incentive to those who are failing to work harder. This would shift the incentive from superior achievement to passing work. An additional restriction could be imposed, stating that anyone's grades that drop significantly would be denied a pass card for the next quarter.

We should make an attempt to allow this opportunity to reach as many students as possible. A trial period in such an open campus setup might clear up some misgivings about the system. Those supporting such a system should take action to see that something is done.

Once a year, in March, the

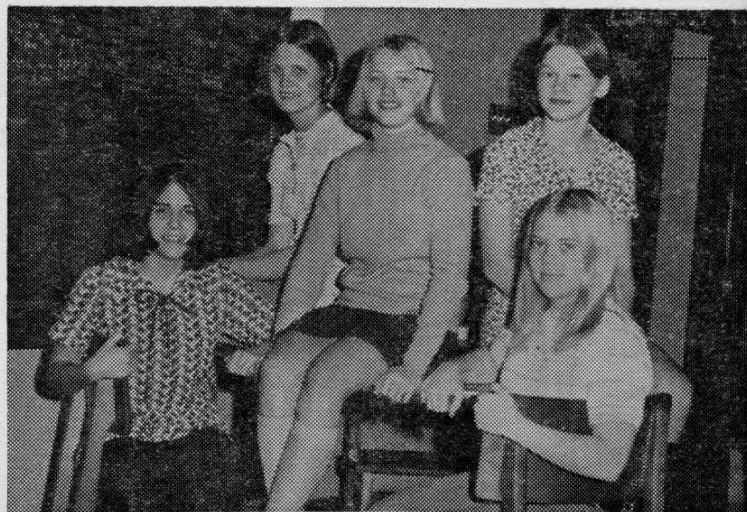

drug abuse information center will be set up in the library on Tuesday. Literature will be available for the students to read and will also be distributed to some of the grade school students.

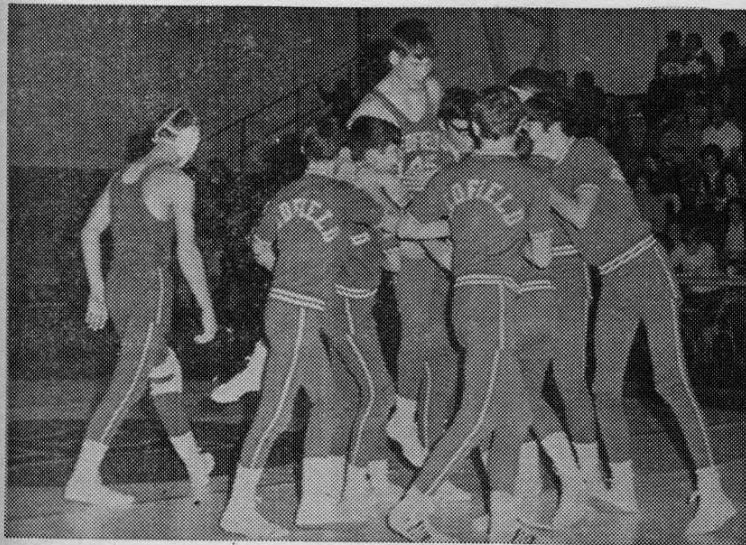

Milbank is the site of an NEC contest on January 21, between the Bulldogs of MHS and the Redfield Pheasants. The Redfield cagers met Milbank earlier in the year and were defeated by a score of 54-41.

Redfield will host Clark on January 28 in another Northeast Conference contest. Clark rolled over Redfield in their first meeting this season by a score of 101-47. Clark is sitting in the NEC's third place slot with a 3-2 conference record.

Faulkton will be at Redfield on January 29, for a non-conference tilt. Last season RHS dropped the Trojans 53-49.

Webster

Redfield's cage team turned in one of its finest halves of basketball of the season, but dropped the game 83-56 after the Webster Bearcats turned on a third quarter rally. The game was played on January 15 in the Redfield armory.

Russ Battey turned in a fine individual performance, scoring 19 points and securing 13 rebounds. Daryl Jungwirth was the only other Pheasant in double figures with 10 counters. Webster outrebounded the home team 41-34, but RHS had fewer turnovers as the visitors turned the ball over 21 times compared to 19 Redfield turnovers.

The "B" squad kept up its winning pace by topping Webster 56-46. Steve Jones hit 10 points for the sophs and Tim Esser grabbed 13 caroms.

Sisseton

The visiting Sisseton Redmen stopped the winless Pheasants by a score of 78-57. The Redfield squad held their own until a third

quarter rally put the Redmen ahead to stay.

A last second basket was the tool used by the Wessington Springs Spartans to defeat Redfield in the consolation game of the tourney. After leading most of the game the RHS cagers lost by a score of 54-52.

Redfield led at all quarter stops by scores of 13-7, 28-21, and 43-33 before losing the game on the opponents' rally. Russ Battey led the scoring attack with 15 counters; he was followed by Steve Raebel, hitting 14. Daryl Jungwirth was the leading rebounder as he grabbed 16 caroms. Jungwirth also chipped in 10 points. Bob Tiff pulled down 13 rebounds, and Russ Battey was credited with 8.

The home team had trouble finding the hole as they hit on only 30% of their field goal attempts. Russ Battey scored nine to lead the team in scoring.

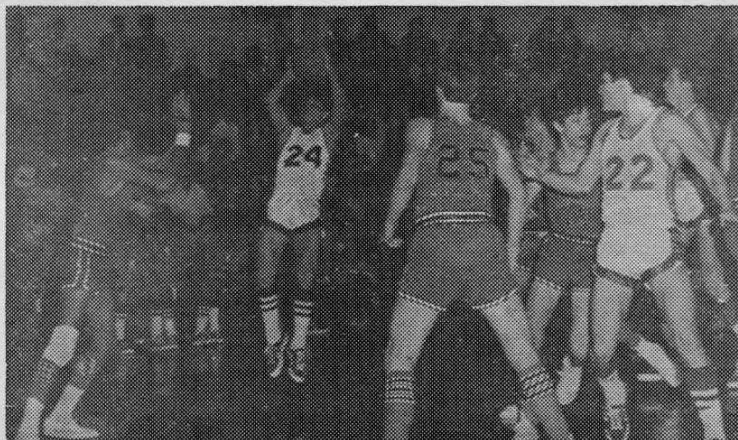

Guidance Department Begins Job Placement Work

Redfield High School has opened a Job Placement Service, which is being provided through the Guidance Department. The primary objective of this service is to put students who are interested in working, in contact with people who have need of their services or skills.

Students 16 years and older, who were interested in part-time or odd job employment, were asked to fill out a job preference sheet. After the students had indicated their job preferences, their names were placed on employment rosters.

To promote this endeavor, each Chamber of Commerce Member received a letter from the Guidance Department asking for assistance in providing the students

with job experiences. In addition, each Wednesday morning, students advertise the Job Placement Service on KFCB during the weekly school events presentation.

When a potential employer contacts the Job Placement Service, he indicates the nature of work, the date and time of employment and the wage. The Guidance Department then checks the employment roster and contacts a student who has indicated that he would like to do a certain kind of job. If the student is interested, his name is then submitted to the employer.

The following are some of the kinds of jobs which students are interested in doing: clerking, clerical work, waitress or waiter, gas station attendant, farm work, car-

ry-out boy or stock boy, janitorial work, receptionist, kitchen help, and nurses aides. Students have also indicated an interest in doing odd jobs such as ironing, baby sitting, shoveling snow, sewing, etc.

Some of the students have free periods during the day and will be allowed to work for as long as their free time permits if they have filed a parent permission slip with the Guidance Office.

Thus far responses have been favorable and some of the students have secured jobs with business establishments on a part-time basis. Off-job employment is be-

coming more popular as the program progresses. Requests for students to enter apprenticeships have been received. The Vocational Department and the Guidance Department are working on the possibility of incorporating the learning situation with the offered job apprenticeships.

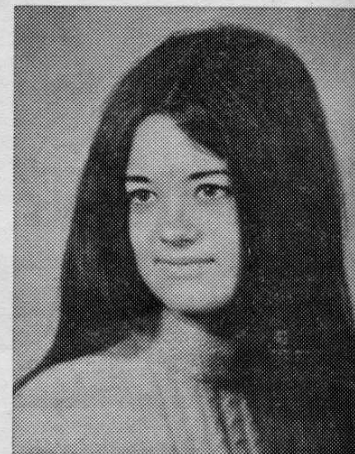

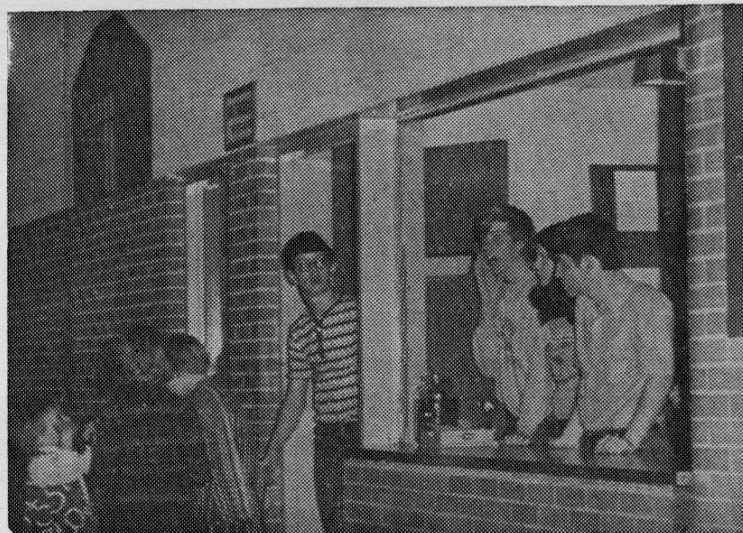
