Bill is a varsity debater, a member of R Club, and is in track and cross country. Randy is Minn-Dak district Key Club treasurer, associate editor of the PHEASANT CALL, Village Council treasurer, and is on the varsity basketball team. Daryl Jungwirth participates in football and basketball and is a member of AFS Club and Key Club. Daryl Muellenberg is in football and R Club.

Paul Patterson is Junior Class president, Key Club secretary, and is in football, wrestling, and R Club. John is a member of Key Club and Photography Club. Rick Brown is a member of the band. Larry Crook is the other alternate.

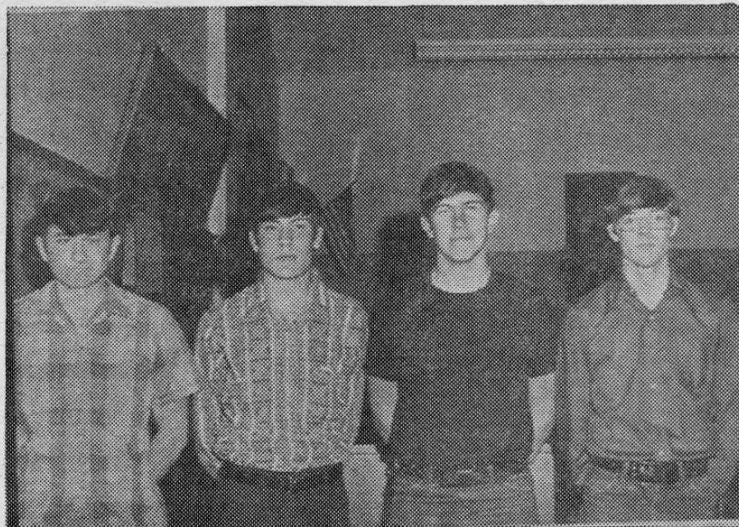

Juniors and seniors from five area schools have been invited to attend Career Night on March 21. The event, organized by Mrs. Madlynn Forsyth, starts at 7 p.m.

Representatives from twenty-four occupational fields will be here to give interested students from RHS, Doland, Tulare, Northwestern, and Hitchcock a run-down on their chosen field. The students will learn what education is required or recommended for a certain job. Job data will be discussed. Included will be salary, hours, working conditions, advancement, expenses, benefits, advantages and disadvantages.

Approximately fifteen trade and vocational schools will also have representatives here. The students will be free to visit with these people and ask questions concerning schooling and training.

The evening will be divided into two sessions to allow the students to listen to two speakers. Free time will be allowed for the students to ask questions and visit with representatives of the various trade schools.

## Students Should Restrict Participation

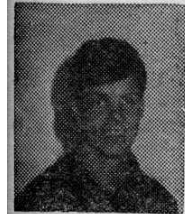
Lack of interest and dedication is one of the problems. If we confine ourselves to a few activities, we can contribute to the club's success, and in this way enhance the student group.

### National Parks Provide Beauty

Although Great Britain is one of the most densely populated countries in the world, there are still wild and beautiful places where one can see the native mammals, birds and flowers. Of the 120,000 square miles in England and Wales, 5,258 square miles are designated as National Parks.

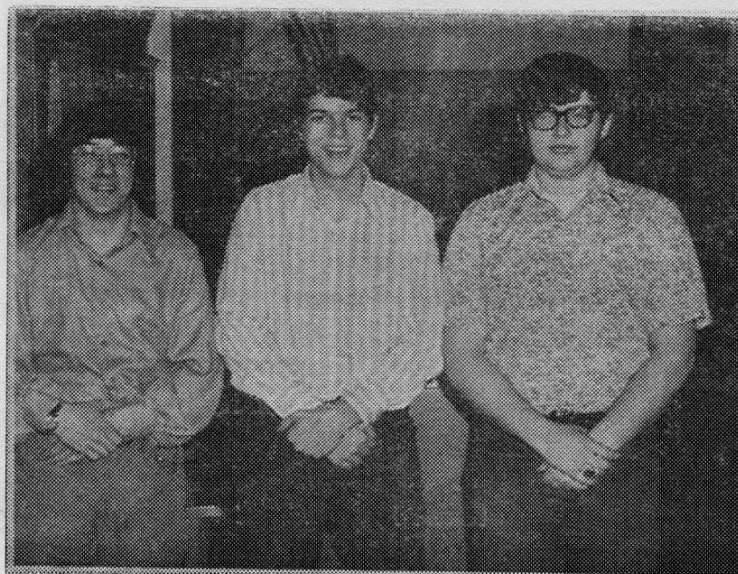


The largest of these parks is the Lake District, which is 866 square miles, and Westmorland in the North of the country. In this area England's highest mountains, Scafell Pike, Helvellyn and Skiddaw are found. Also in the North is the largest lake, Windermere.

The two National parks which are nearest my home are Dorlinoor and Exmoor. Dorlinoor covers an area of 365 square miles in Deron and is the largest area of high moonland in Southern England. This park is rich in the relics of man's past and offers a good recreation area. Exmoor covers 265 square miles of Somerset and Deron. This is a flat, heather clad plateau on the Northern Coast, which makes it a popular holiday resort.

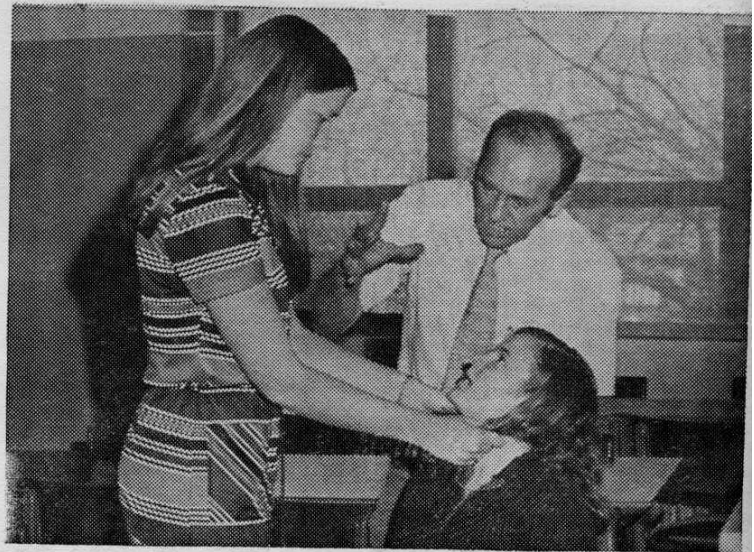
In England and Wales there is a total of nine parks which are kept up Nationally, but there are

## FTA Faction Travels To USD

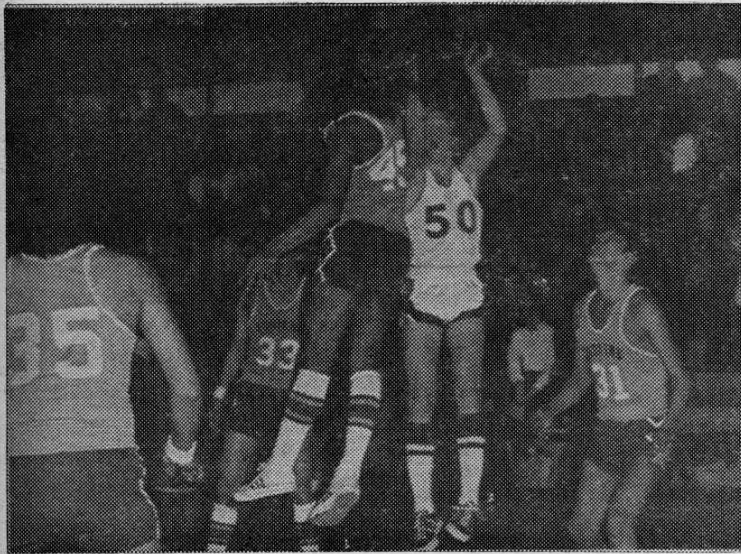
Last Friday the FTA juniors and seniors visited the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. Mr. Henry Dunkel accompanied the group.

## *Matmen Complete Fine Season, Coach Picks Wrestling Lettermen*

Coach Rich Strande's wrestlers finished the 1971-72 season with a 7-5 dual meet record. Bruce Cartner, Terry Hansen, and Gary Lambert were chosen as tri-captains for the Pheasants.

The wrestlers finished in a three way tie for first place in the NEC with Sisseton and Milbank. The Pheasants had a 6-1 conference record. Redfield finished the season impressively, as they captured second in the sectional and finished fourth in the state tournament.

The senior tri-captains led the Pheasants at the state tournament. Bruce Cartner compiled an impressive 21-4 record on his way to capturing second in the state at 119. Gary Lambert was second at 145, and had a fine season record of 15-2. With a 22-6 record for the season, Terry Hansen finished third in the state at 155.

Freshman Dale Jessen completed the season with an 18-3 record. Sophomores Rick Welke and Steve Jessen had 17-4 and 13-3 season records, respectively.

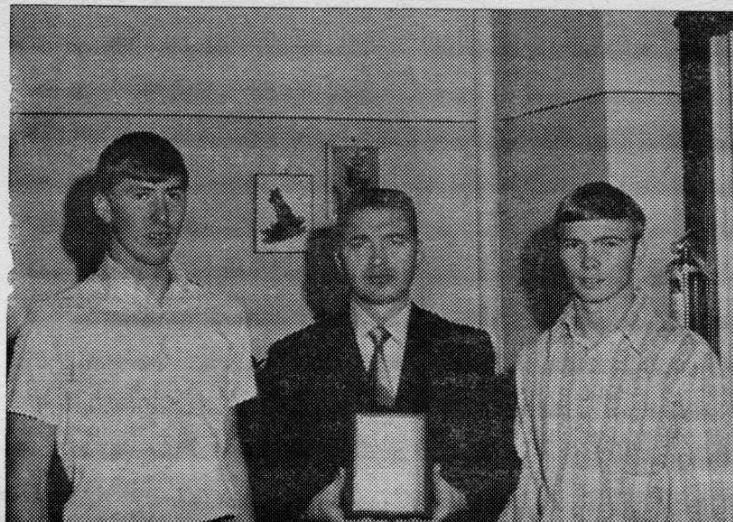
Coach Strande has named 16 wrestling lettermen for this year. The lettermen include 6 seniors, 2 juniors, 7 sophomores, and one freshman.

## *Cagers Grab Third With Sectional Win*

Lots of hustle and some real team work boosted the Golden Pheasants to a 67-57 win over the tall Brookings Bobcats March 8. The game, played at Watertown, gave the Pheasants the third place berth in the Section I Tourney.

Redfield dropped behind early in the game but scrapped back to lead 28-23 at the intermission. The Pheasants had a dry spell during the third period and dropped behind by a score of 42-38 at the end of the quarter. The final period, however, was a different story as Redfield gained 14 points on the Bobcats to provide the margin of victory.

A key factor in the game was free throw shooting as the Pheasants connected on 33 of 43 at-

tempts. Russ Battey hit on 13 of 15 free throw attempts on his way to a game high 27 points. Steve Raebel was the only other Pheasant player in double figures as he scrapped his way to 17 points.

The hustling Pheasants forced Brookings into 20 turnovers for the game, many of them coming in the crucial fourth quarter. Although Brookings held a slight, 42-38 rebounding edge for the game, the Pheasants snared 11 to only eight for the Bobcats in the final, decisive period of play.

Sectional play began for Redfield March 7, as the Pheasants met the Flandreau Indians. Redfield was beaten 65-50 in the game which was played at Watertown.

Shooting percentage was the Pheasants' downfall. Redfield could manage only 23 percent from the field, although the team did hold slight edges in the rebounding and turnover departments.

The well-balanced Flandreau attack earned the Indians a 35-26 halftime lead. Four of the five Indian starters scored in double figures, and the Pheasants were never able to close to nearer than six points in the second half.

Redfield outbattled the Indians on the boards, gaining a margin of five. Daryl Jungwirth and Reed Siegling had 13 and 10 caroms, respectively, to lead the Pheasants. High-scoring senior Russ Battey led all scorers in the game, raining in 19 counters. Steve Raebel chipped in 12 points as the only other Pheasant in double figures.

### **Sisseton**

Pheasant cagers closed out regular season play at Sisseton on March 4. Redfield dropped an 81-54 decision to the Redmen to close loop play at 0-14.

Although the Pheasants managed to stay close during the first period, Sisseton found the basket early in the second quarter and entered the dressing room with a 37-22 halftime lead. Sisseton added seven points to the lead during the third quarter and then nailed five more points to that lead during the final period to provide the winning margin.

The Pheasants lost the game from the field as all other departments were relatively close. The Pheasants shot only 15 percent from the field to 44 percent for the Redmen.

Russ Battey topped Redfield scoring with 11 points, followed closely by Steve Raebel with 10. Daryl Jungwirth topped the rebounders with 11.

The Chicks closed the season with a 53-37 victory to push the season mark to 14-4. Rich Jonkor had 11 points and Tim Esser 1 rebounds to lead those departments.

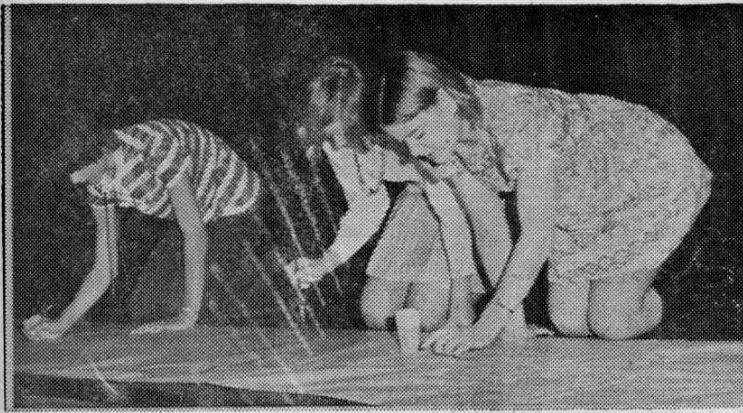

## School Provides Bus Transportation To Meet Needs Of Rural Students

Throughout the school year, bus transportation is available to RHS students. This service is provided by the school district.

Rural students are taken to and from school each day. If a student wishes to remain after school for a curricular activity, he may ride home in a special activity bus which leaves after athletic practice each night. School buses also

Training sessions are held for bus drivers. These meetings, held several times a year, help ensure the safety of the bus passengers.

One driver, who has been with the system for fourteen years, noted the changes that have occurred during his employment. He observed that bus service has become systematic and efficient. The timing of loading and unloading has been perfected so that there is no traffic congestion. In addition, two-way radios have allowed the drivers to report pass-

ing violations and mechanical problems.

Those drivers currently employed by the school board include Kenneth Avery, George Connor, George Harms, Don Lux, Roy Robertson, Darrel Rohlf, and Al Rose. Other men who work either full-time or part-time as drivers are Duane Sanger, Roy Siebrecht, Norv Snow, Kenneth Steele, Ron Tennill, Art Tiff, and Clayton Welke. This year two women are employed, Mrs. Maxine Waddington and Mrs. Ila May Becker.

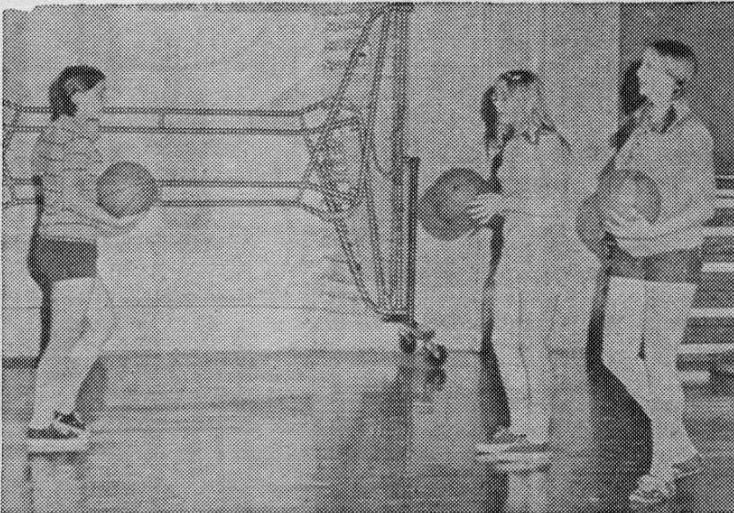
