
### FFA Sponsors District School



All we need is cooperation and concern from every student in



# Track Season Starts For RHS Thinclads

RHS tracksters are looking forward to yet another successful season under Coach Ken Greeno and Assistant Coaches Richard Strande and Dale Anderson. The thinclads began workouts earlier this month in preparation for the meets which start in April.

There are approximately 45 boys out for track this year. Coach Greeno will work with the runners; Mr. Strande, the umpires; annd Mr. Anderson, the weightmen. Although quite a few lettermen were lost through graduation, the Pheasants should have a strong nucleus and a good shot at taking the Northeast Conference crown, which has been won by Redfield for several years run-

ning, Senior distance runner Don Zundel is looked to lead Pheasant runners and the loss of his brother, Bob, through a family move to North Dakota will undoubtedly hurt Pheasant chances in the longer races.

Redfield begins the season in a triangular meet with Conde and Northwestern at Redfield April 5. Other highlights of the track season include the Redfield Relays April 21, the Big Four Meet at Redfield April 26, the Northern Plains Meet at Redfield May 5, the Northeast Conference meet at Aberdeen May 12, and the regional and state meets at Watertown and Mitchell on May 20 and May 26-27, respectively. Other meets on the schedule for the Pheasants are a dual meet at Pierre April 7, the Sioux Relays at Eagle Butte April 14, the S.D.S.U. Invitational at Brookings April 15, and the Watoma Relays at Watertown April 22. Also on the slate are the Sisseton Relays at Sisseton April 28 and the Aberdeen Relays April 29 at Aberdeen.

A small contingent of Redfield thinclads traveled to an indoor meet at Fargo March 18. The contest included entries from three states and was held in the North Dakota State University Fieldhouse.

Sophomore trackster Bob Zundel secured the only Redfield points in the meet by winning fourth place in the two-mile race. Bob completed the race in 10:28, which betters the school two-mile record which he had set last year.

Kevin Boschee and Scott Hicks reached the semifinals in the 60yard dash and high and low hurdles, respectively, but were unable to enter the finals.

## Cage Squad Finishes Rebuilding Year; Coach Lon Scriver Picks Lettermen

Basketball Coach Lonnie Scriver picked his 1971-72 lettermen. The list includes two seniors, five juniors, and three sophomores.

Senior letterwinners were Russ Battey and Steve Raebel. Daryl Jungwirth, Randy Swedeen, Dave Dorsey, Kevin Gaulrapp, and Randy Bush were the junior lettermen. Sophomores Reed Siegling, Rich Jankord, and Steve Jones also won basketball letters. Tom Moon, Dean Jankord, Bill Betten, and Tim Robinson received monograms. Winning student manager letters were Kendall Swedeen, Jim Bradley, and Dave Wilson.

The 1971-72 cage squad ended the season with a 2-20 record, post-

ing wins over Faulkton and Brookings. Redfield finished in the Northeast Conference cellar with a 0-14 record. The Pheasants were fourth in the Big Four Tourney, falling to Miller and Wessington Springs. In Section I Tournament play RHS was third. The team fell to the Flandreau Indians in the opener and won the season finale over Brookings in the consolation game.

Russ Battey paced the squad in scoring by hitting 348 points and a 15.7 average. Daryl Jungwirth counted 222 points for a 10.1 season's average. Steve Raebel scored 192 points. Jungwirth was the

leading rebounder with 237 retrieves. Battey pulled down 132 caroms and Randy Swedeen grabbed 94. In the assists category Steve Raebel led with 33 feeds. Battey had 28 assists and Dave Dorsey fed for 21 baskets.

Russ Battey and Steve Raehel hit on 36 percent of their shots from the field to lead the team. Jungwirth connected on 34 percent of his shots. Battey also led the team in free throw percentage with 63 percent, followed by Raebel and Jungwirth who shot for 56 percent.

## Soph, Frosh Cagers Play In YMCA Extravaganza

Coach Lonnie Scriver took the RHS sophomores to the YMCA Tri-State Basketball Tournament in Sioux Falls on March 24. The sophs dropped their first game to Spencer, Iowa, 50-48, in overtime.


The tournament included teams from South Dakota, Iowa, and Minnesota. Redfield was one of 176 teams participating. This is the largest tournament of its kind in the nation.

The game was close all the way. Spender led 12-9 at the end of the first quarter and 25-22 at the half, but Redfield rallied in the third quarter to lead 32-29. The score was tied at 43 all at the end of regulation play.

Denis Guenthner paced Redfield, as he counted 17 points. Don Bruce came off the bench to score 11, and Terry Kegler added 9. Because the tournament was single elimination, the sophs didn't participate in further tournament competition.





## Key Clubbers To Face Keyette, Faculty Teams


