
Students Win Math Honors

Redfield's dairy team captured 7th in state competition, and individually, Mike Brink tied for fifth and Dennis Becker received an honorable mention.


The livestock team tied for 8th place, and individual awards were given to Gary Lambert and Mike Brink.

One could possibly assume that the students are satisfied and that little is needed in changes.

This attitude certainly wasn't prevelant at the student council meeting with the North Central evaluators last week. Council members aired many grievances that had previously not been mentioned. Matters relating to curriculum, facultystudent relations, and various regulations were discussed at

the meeting.

Most of the areas have not been covered by student council in the past. Student council should strongly consider dealing with these areas. It should serve as a source of expression of the student body's opinion in these matters. Although the council has no authority in these areas, it could increase the student group's influence if worked properly.

The upcoming student council elections may determine the direction student council will take in the following year. It is up to us to decide whether the group will continue in a narrow course or expand its range of concerns. As in any change in student affairs, it must originate with the students. We must let the candidates know that there is concern, and that we want to see things changed.

Redfield tracksters will have relatively few meets during the upcoming weeks. All of the meets, however, are important ones and the Pheasants will be putting out in hope sof gaining victories.

First of the meets will be the Northern Plains Meet in Redfield on May 5. Normally, Faulkton, Northwestern, Willow Lake, and Redfield would be participating in the meet, but this year Castlewood will be entered instead of Willow Lake. It looks to be a well-balanced event, with Redfield perhaps holding a slight edge.

On May 12, the Pheasant thinclads will travel to Aberdeen for the all-important Northeast Conference Track Meet. Redfield is the defending champion, as has been the case for the past few years, and the tracksters of Coach Ken Greeno will be out looking to add another to their long string of conference titles.

May 20 marks the date for the regional track meet at Watertown. This is the event which decides which athletes will participate in the state meet, and is undoubtedly one of the most important of the track season.

Following the regional, the state meet will be held at Mitchell May 26-27. Events which have been strong for the Pheasants during the season, and may make a showing in the state meet are the 880 and mile relays, along with the

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Runners Win Big Four, Engage In Redfield, Sisseton Relays

Athletes from Redfield High School captured their sixteenth straight Big Four tract title at Redfield April 26. The Pheasants tallied 93 points to outdistance second place Gettysburg by 25 points in taking what was also their nineteenth title in the 20 year history of the event.

Redfield won the meet on depth, winning only six of 18 events but placing in all events. Kevin Boschee turned in an outstanding individual performance in winning the 100 and 220 yard dashes. Rod Hardie was another individual winner, capturing the 440 yard dash. Scott Hicks was the other individual winner from Redfield, winning the triple jump. The 880 yard relay team, composed of Eric Flint, Boschee, Dean Jan-

kord and Steve Raebel, raced to victory in their event as did the team of Raebel, Flint, Don Zundel, and Hardie in the mile relay.

On April 28, Coach Ken Greeno took his RHS track squad to Sisseton to compete in the Sisseton Relays. Team points were not kept for the meet.

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


