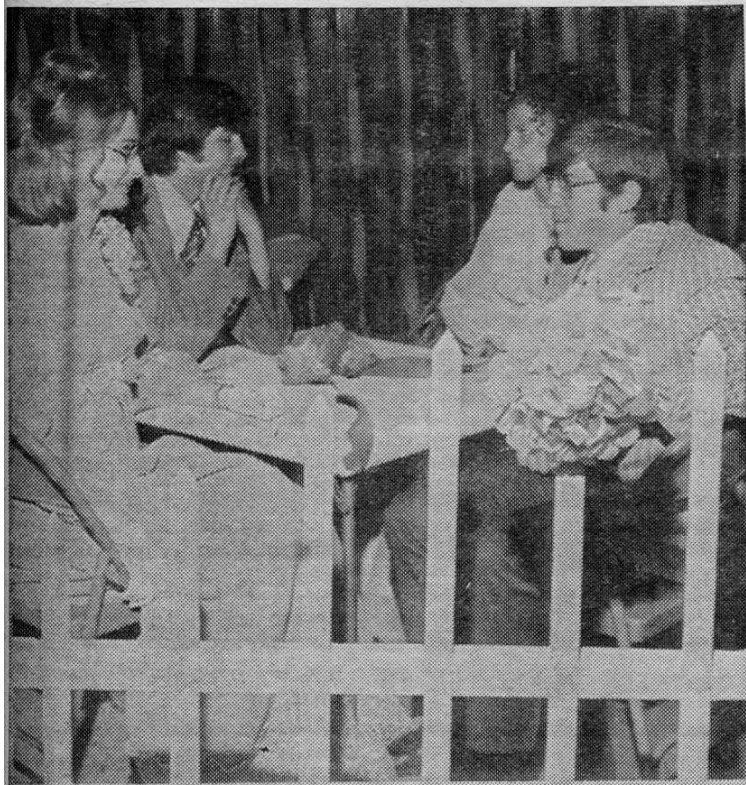

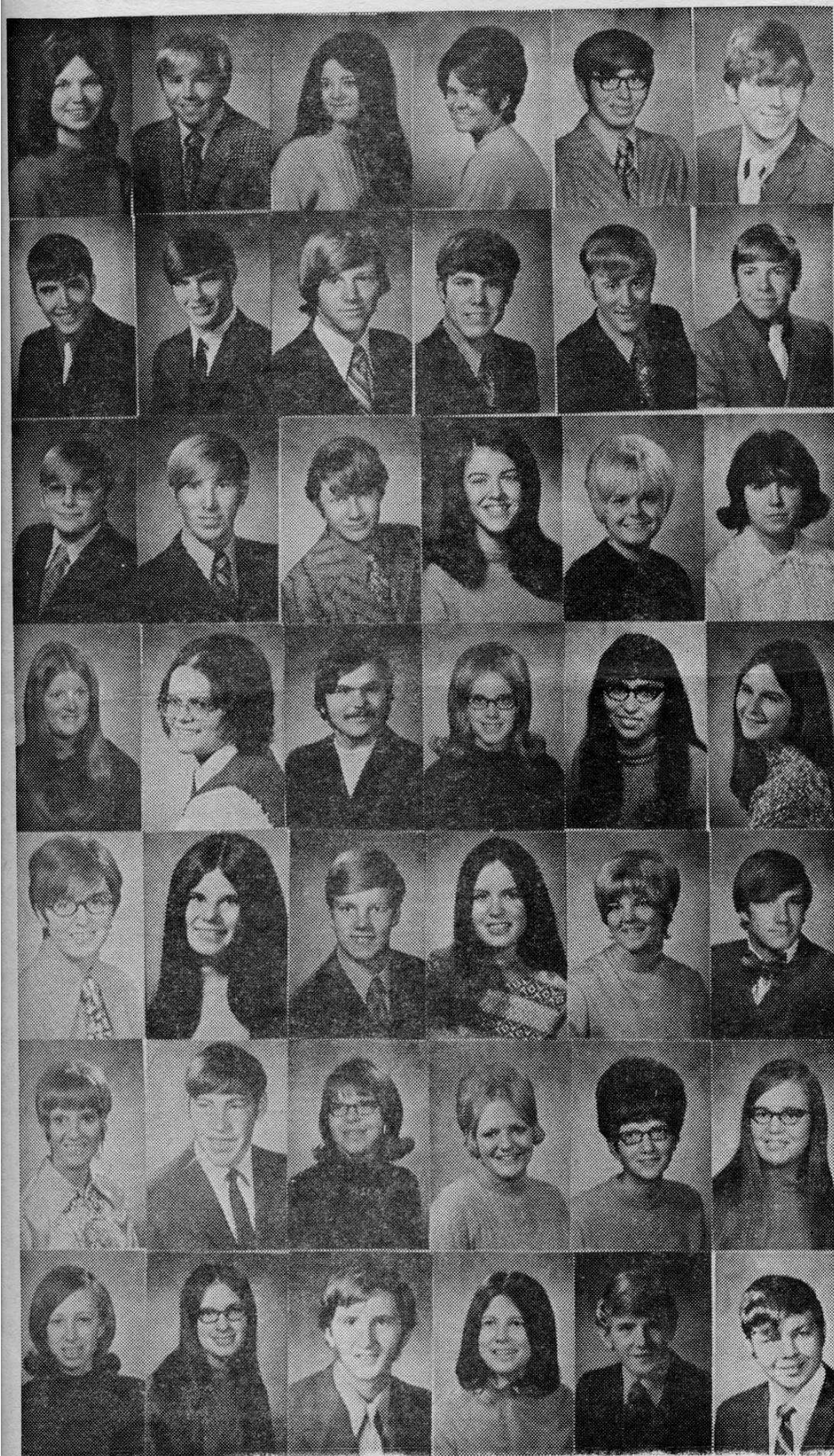

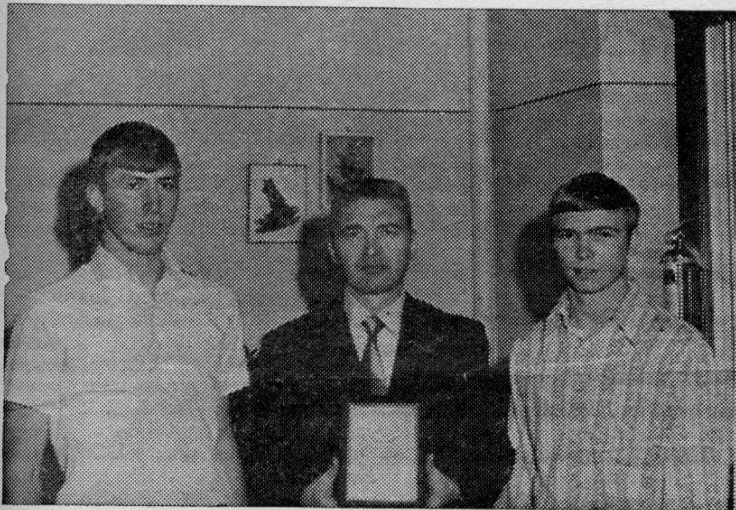

Splashing their way to victory in the Northeast Conference track meet were the Redfield Pheasants. The RHS squad nipped Groton 63-62 for their sixth consecutive NEC title on May 12, at Aberdeen.

Redfield's well balanced crew scored in all but two events. Winning first places were Kevin Boschee in the 100, Don Zundel in the mile run, and the 880 relay team of Dean Jankord, Eric Flint, Steve Raebel, and Boschee. Placing second were Scott Hicks in the high hurdles, the medley relay team of Jankord, Boschee, Raebel, and Rod Hardie; and the two mile relay team made up of Bill Betten, Zundel, Hardie, and Bob Severance.

Doug Fink, low hurdles; Flint, 100 yard dash; Hardie, 440 yard dash; Zundel, 880 yard run; Steve Betten in the discus; and the mile relay team of Flint, Raebel, Zundel, and Hardie all finished third. Hicks finished fourth in the low hurdles, and the long jump, while Bill Betten was fourth in the 880 yard run. Finishing fifth were Boschee in the 220, Hicks in the triple jump, and Don Bruce in the high jump.

RHS racked up 123 points in defeating Faulkton, Northwestern, and Castlewood in the Northern Plains meet. The meet was held at Redfield on May 5.

Redfield won 12 of the 18 events in the varsity divisions and three of the four new records set were by Redfield runners. Kevin Boschee picked up a meet record in the 100, Rod Hardie set the record in the 440, and the 880 yard relay team composed of Dean

Jankord, Eric Flint, Steve Raebel, and Boschee also set a new standard.

Other first place winners were Boschee, 220; Don Zundel, mile; Rick Marlette, two mile; Hicks, long jump, triple jump, and high hurdles; Doug Fink, low hurdles; medley team of Jankord, Boschee, Raebel, and Hardie; and mile relay squad of Flint, Raebel, Zundel, and Hardie.

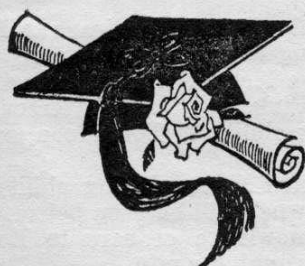
