


Cast Members Prepare Musical



Social Revolution Affects School

Recently, book stores, magazine racks and libraries have been flooded with books which deal with a very relevant and very popular topic. The topic that is drawing the readers is

not sex, but social upheaval, revolution.

Why has this issue begun to catch on? The answer is not a one word response. It is a very broad and complicated answer, one which is a product of many years of evolution. Man, at least some of them, have come to the realization that perhaps our species has developed a technological world which we cannot cope with psychologically. Therefore, the contemporary authors are calling for a new society and a new culture. Our present beliefs and values and priorities are leading us into a self-determined destruction. We must discover our shortcomings immediately, and begin our transition in the very near future if we hope to continue as the dominant species.

Although the home determines to a great extend the behavior of an individual, the educational system can be the pioneer in this movement since it does help determine how people will behave in society. Whether it will take the lead is open to speculation. Since the primary goal of the social revolution would be to restore each person's individuality, the school could reverse its present direction which actually contributes to the loss of self. From the beginning school teaches students how to conform and how to find a

place in society.

The regimentation and discipline are exploited to the extent of insanity. School is intensely concerned with teaching students to stop thinking and start obeying. It teaches one to accept authority without question and respect authority simply because of its position. Democracy is praised in theory by the school but rejected in practice. Independence and democracy have become two of the greatest

sins in the school.

The school tries to force-feed a whole set of values and attitudes about advertising business competition, success, and the American was of life. And this is carried on amid an atmosphere of dishonesty and hypocricy. No one will admit that the methods of teaching may be wrong, that the textbooks might be boring and outdated, that much of what the school does might not be in the best interest of the students, and that there could be other ways of providing an educational experience. This side of the story can no longer be hidden from the students or another generation may have to suffer the consequences of an unadapted society. Do we want that?

First, I will give a few of my impressions of Thanksgiving. It is something new to me, since we do not celebrate Thanksgiving in

On November 23, I woke up as usual and I was preparing for a normal day. When I turned on TV I saw many parades and celebrations, and then I remembered it was Thanksgiving. I was very impressed with the celebrations on television. I did not expect a big meal at noon so when I saw the tremendous amount of food

before us, I was shocked.

In Venezuela we have feasts also but they are always in the evening. It is strange that we also eat turkey at our feasts. In the afternoon I went hunting. For me Thanksgiving was just another day, except that I had no classes and I got a very good meal. I could see that it was special to the Americans though.

Last weekend was also good because I discovered my favorite American sport, basketball. I really liked the fast action displayed in basketball. I got very excited at the game and when it was over I had a sore throat. I was really impressed with the enthusiasm of the fans and I am glad to be one. I have a pretty good understanding of the game of basketball since it is played a little in Venezuela. My favorite aspects of the game are watching a fast break and seeing someone make a long shot.

I don't understand wrestling as well because wrestling is not a school sport in Venezuela. It is relatively unpopular in my country. 

Wrestlers Manhandle ESD Conference Foes

Coach Richard Strande and the RHS wrestlers will compete in the NEC tournament on December 9 at Webster. Last year the Pheasants captured 4th place in the tourney, tallying 71½ points. Redfield finished behind Milbank, Webster, and Sisseton.

Upcoming dual matches are Aberdeen Roncalli on December 13, at Aberdeen, and home matches against Mobridge and Webster on December 16 and 19, respectively. The squad will also travel to Britton for a match on December 22. Last year the Pheasants defeated all four of these opponents.

Mitchell

Pheasant grapplers defeated Mitchell 24-21 in a non-conference match at Mitchell on December 2. The victory ran the Pheasants' non-conference record to two victories in as many outings.

Ed Galvin won a 5-0 decision from his Mitchell opponent in the 98 weight class. Jeff Gaulrapp recorded the next victory for Redfield as he decidened his opponent for the 119 weight class. Dan Dvorak also won on a decision 4-3 in the 126 weight class.

Dan Appel recorded the final decision for the Pheasants as he defeated his opponent 7-5 in the 138 weight class. Steve Betten tied the match at 18-18 when he pinned his opponent in the 167 weight class. Heavyweight Robert Jungwirth put the deciding points on the scoreboard as he pinned his opponent.

Redfield reserves ran their record to 2-0 as they defeated the Mitchell reserves 38-17 in the preliminary match.

Huron

Pheasant wrestlers opened their

season with a victory. They defeated a highly rated Huron squad 26-15 in Redfield on November 28.

Mark Muellenberg decisioned Rick Sass 6-5 at the 98 weight class. Rick Welke won the 112 weight class with a 5-2 win over Ron Curr. Cagers Show Power, Conquer Dogs, Cats

Coach Lonnie Scriver's cagers will host Clark on December 8, and Roncalli on December 15. Both games are Northeast Conference games.

Redfield will be out to avenge last year's losses to Clark and Roncalli. The Comets topped the Pheasants 82-78 and 101-47 last year. Redfield was defeated 97-57 and 74-52 last year by the Cavaliers.

Milbank

Milbank's Bulldogs were defeated by Redfield 94-78 on December 1 at Milbank. The win set the Pheasants' conference record at 2-0 and their season's record at 2-1.

The game was a wide open offensive affair. Both teams used full court presses which caused a total of 71 turnovers for the game.

Milbank led at the end of the first quarter, but the Pheasants came back to lead 56-45 at the half. The Bulldogs went ahead in the third quarter, but Redfield pulled away in the final stanza.

The Pheasants were out rebounded 46-35 by the taller Milbank quintet, but made up for it by shooting an exceptional 73 percent from the floor.

Daryl Jungwirth poured in a career high of 33 points for Red-

field. Reed Siegling added 23 counters for the Pheasants. Rich Jankord and Steve Jones pumped in 19 and 10 points, respectively.

The "B" squad suffered its second loss of the early season, 69-59 to the Milbank "B" squad. Gerald Nuhsbaumer totaled 20 points and Tim Booze added 13 for Redfield.

Watertown

Redfield cagers hosted a nonconference game against a strong Watertown Arrow team on November 25. The Pheasants came out on the short end of a 66-52 score.

The Pheasants jumped to an early lead in the first quarter, and still led 29-28 at the half, despite a Watertown rally. However, the Arrows began to pull away early in the fourth quarter and went on to defeat the Pheasants.

Randy Swedeen counted 12 points to lead the Pheasants and Jones added 10 points for Redfield. Tim Esser and Reed Siegling each had 9 points and 9 rebounds.

The Redfield "B" squad was downed by Watertown 50-33 in the preliminary game. Watertown's "B" squad also employed a press which bothered the Chicks. Ken



Boys and girls responsible for the sets have been busy painting the scenes on the backdrops. The backdrops were drawn by Andy Dickhaut, Bob Miller, Tim Day, and Tracy Jensen. First the backdrops must be sewn, reinforced, and sized. After that, the scene is drawn on and painted. Kevin Boschee, student director, has been largely responsible for assisting Mr. Kahre in the costuming and set construction of "Hello Dolly!".

Several workshops were held for the make-up crews to give them practice. Applying stage make-up is a lot different from using street make-up. Several layers must be applied to cut the glare from the powerful stage lights. A chart was prepared for each member of the cast which gives the exact shades and tints for that particular person. Due to the many steps involved, the crew starts making-up the players about two hours before curtain
