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## Journalists Honor Lavone Opitz With Outstanding Athlete Award

Lavone Opitz, a junior of RHS, has been selected as South Dakota's Woman Athlete of the year by the South Dakota Sportswriters Association. She received this award by participating in track and field last spring and summer.

Lavone led the RSH girls track team to the state title by winning, in record time, the 80-yard hurdles and 100-meter hurdles, finishing second in the long jump and running anchor of a record breaking 440-yard relay team.

Following the high school season, Lavone continued to run and win. She set a record of :10.0 in the 80-yard hurdles in the State AAU Junior Olympic meet; and in the State JC Junior Champ meet she won the 100-yard dash in :11.7, the 220 in :26.5 and the long jump with a state record leap of 17 feet, 5 inches.

For her performance, she was named outstanding AAU Track and Field girl for 1972. She was also honored as the JC Meet's Outstanding Athlete among both boys and girls.

This summer Lavone entered in the Junior National AAU Women's Pentathlon at Poplar Bluff,

Missouri. There she scored 3,174 points, one point out of second place.

Lavone's achievements do not just end on the athletic field. She has been on the "A" honor roll for three years. She was one of 3 juniors in the class of 95 to be nominated to the Society of Out-

standing American High School Students and to Who's Who Among American Students.

In addition to track and field, Lavone is on the gymnastics team and a member of the chorus. She is also in pep club, drama club, FTA, and has been a cheerleader for three years.

## Senior Girls Enter Snow Queen Event

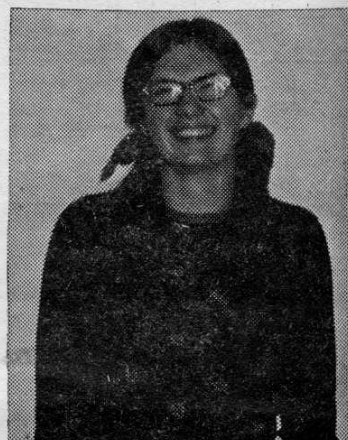

I love Christmas. It is the most beautiful month of the year. But this year I have a new experience because I am spending my Christmas in America. Americans have a different Christmas tradition than Venezuelans.

All over Venezuela people go to church at 4 o'clock on each morning, beginning December 15 and ending December 24. On Christmas Eve we have church at midnight. The police close off some of the main avenues in the evening and the people roller skate. (I always fall down). Parties begin on December 24 and go almost continually until January 7. Our vacation from school begins on December 15, and lasts until January 7.

We have large feasts on Christmas and New Year's Eve. I usually visit my many relatives on December 25 around the city. December 24 and 25 are not real special. December 31 is the big day.

In every class in the school the students draw names and buy gifts for their classmates. The price limit is about \$4.00. In my family I give gifts only to my mother. My mother and father usually give me money for Christmas along with a couple other gifts. On December 15 we have

Dear Santa,

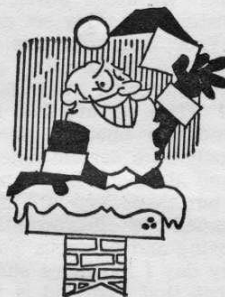

him for a Christmas gift.

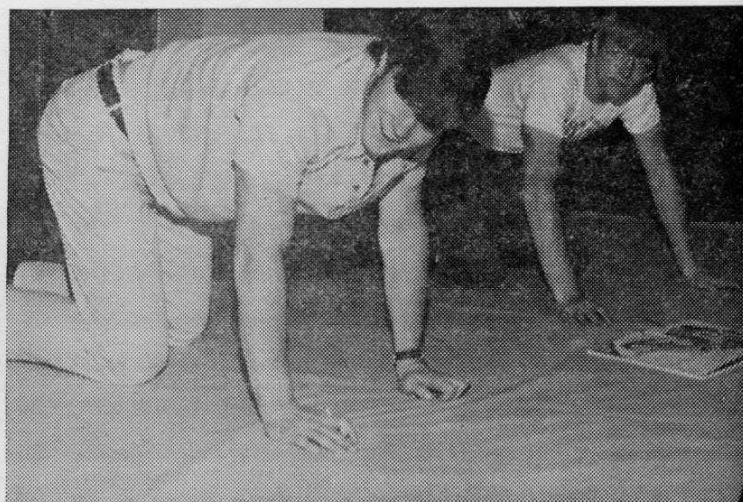

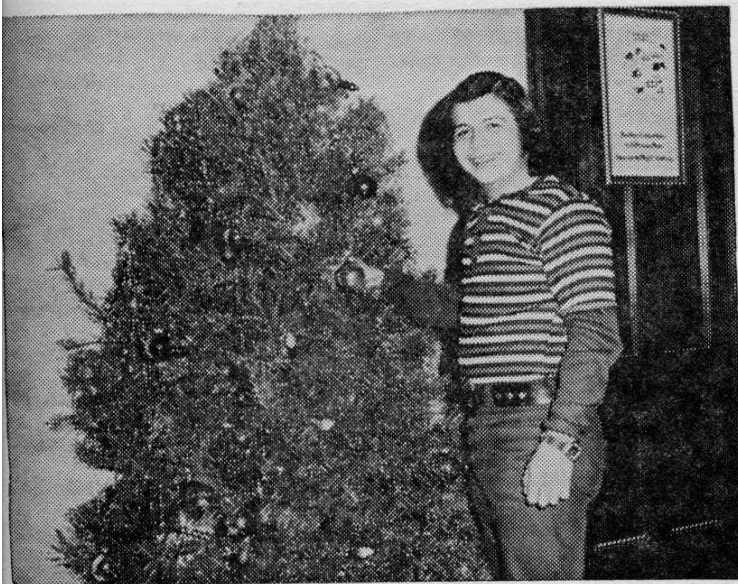

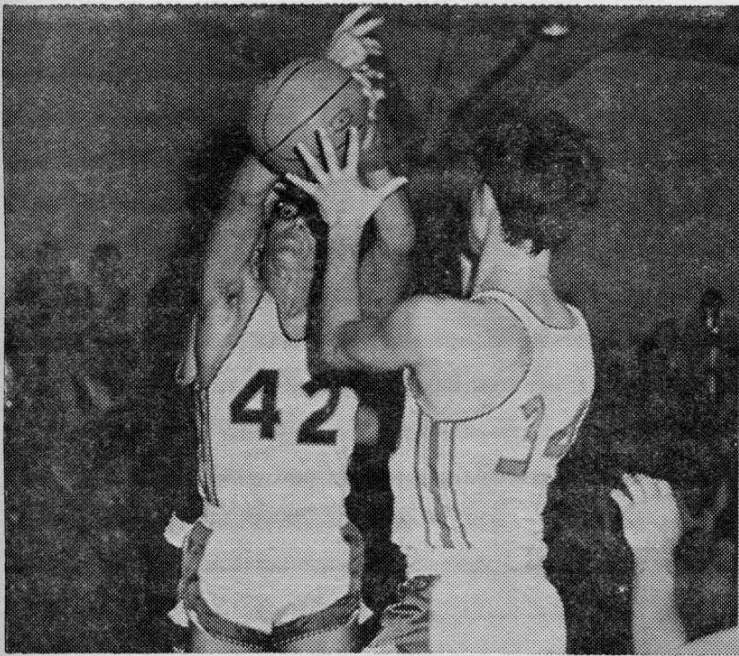
cut? You looked so much better with it short."

## *Cagers Whip Clark In NEC Play; Look Ahead To Britton, Big Four*

Undefeated Britton travels to Redfield Friday night in a must game for the Pheasants to remain in the NEC race. The Braves feature 6-5 senior Dan Yelkin at center, and 6-3 returnee Wally Steiner at forward. Britton is fresh off a big win over the highly touted Roncalli quint.

The Golden Pheasants will battle Miller December 28 in the Big Four. If the Pheasants win, they will meet either Gettysburg or Wessington Springs in the final the next night.

#### **Webster**

Perhaps the Pheasants' poorest game of the season was played at Webster December 16. Redfield came out on the short end of a 67-42 score in the mistake-filled ballgame.

The Pheasants trailed 27-20 at the half, but battled back in the middle of the third stanza to trail by only one. Redfield hit another cold streak, however, and the Bearcats moved to a 40-32 margin at the end of the period.

Steve Jones and Denis Guenther had nine and eight points, respectively, for the Pheasants. Redfield shot a frigid 24 per cent from the field, and also had a poor rebounding night as the Bearcats held a margin of ten.

#### **Roncalli**

Roncalli High's veteran basketball team traveled to Redfield December 15, and left with a firm hold on first place in the NEC. The Cavaliers downed Redfield 83-63 to remain in a first place tie in the NEC, and drop Redfield to second.

Both teams started slowly, but Roncalli heated up during the middle of the first stanza, and went on a scoring binge that left them on top 20-7 after the first quarter. The Pheasants had trouble with Roncalli's pressing defense, and dropped to a 42-23 deficit at the half.

Redfield had balanced scoring in the game with three players in double figures. Steve Jones hit 15 points, Daryl Jungwirth 14, and Reed Siegling counted 10. The big difference in the game was shooting percentage as the Cavaliers gunner for a torrid 55 per cent,

and the Pheasants could manage only a moderate 42 per cent.

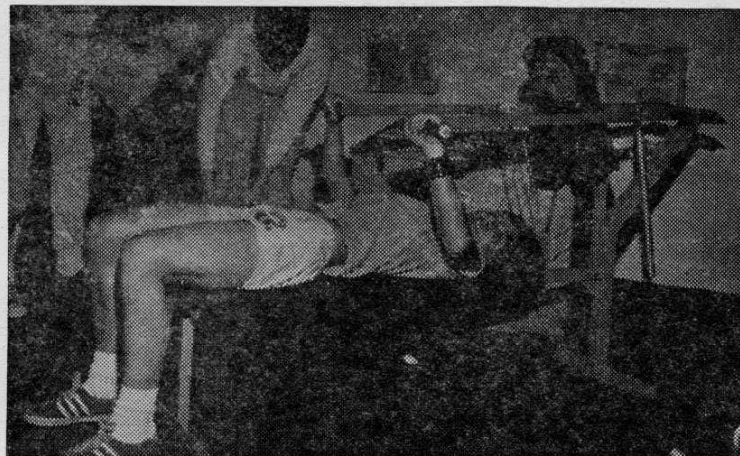
#### **Clark**

The second and third period junior and senior English classes took part in the poll from Redfield. Of the 87 polled from Redfield, 22 stated they had tried an illegal drug.

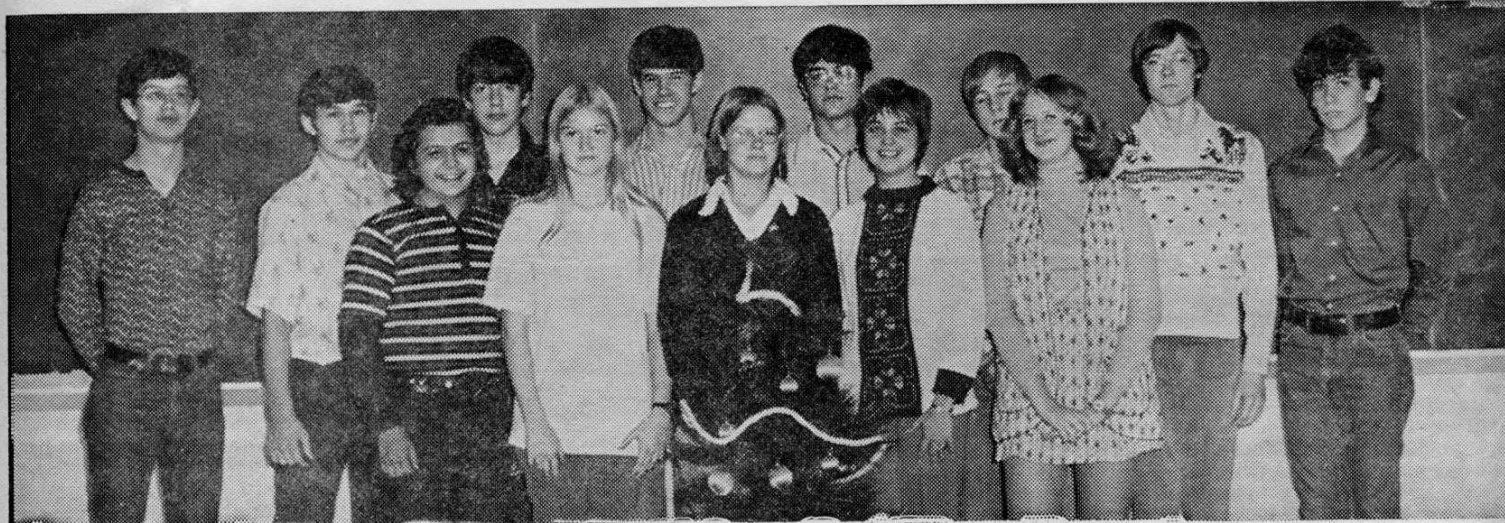
