### Students Participate In Involvement Plan

Community Involvement Workshop was held on February 20-22 at Huron. Mrs. Sue Burgard, kindergarten teacher, Miss Kathleen Johnson, junior high mathematics teacher, Wendy Davis, Barb Johnson, and Dr. Verle Rogers represented Redfield.

The workshop was one of seventeen which is being sponsored by the South Dakota State Department of Public Instruction. The workshops are under the direction of Mountain State Consulting Services to carry out a resolution of the 1972 Legislature. This resolution called for the local school districts to set up a plan for involving parents, students, teachers, and administrators in the planning and development of the educational program.

This community involvement plan is composed of teachers, parents, students, and administrators. It is usually made up of five to twelve people. The activities of the committee are usually coordinated by the Superintendent of Schools, who is a Task Force Coordinator.

This project was set up to study and collect information of problems on specific areas of the state and supply this information to the Task Force Coordinating Committee.

The workshop provided the par-

ticipants the opportunity to explore differences in values held by individuals and to understand how these differences cause people to react differently to situations. Techniques such as paraphrasing, questioning, and introduction of new ideas were practiced.

As was the case last year, the winners will be announced at Awards Night, which is the second week in May. Deliberation was given on the possibility of making all classes (9-11) eligible to run for an office. This proposal will be acted upon at the next meeting.

### Editorially Speaking...

#### Students Shouldn't Abuse Grades

With the end of the third nine week period nearing, the grade controversy again enters the spotlight. That grades are a forgotten subject until a student's immediate necessity of acquiring good grades near report card issuance

is a fact all too prevalent.

Too often, procrastination concerning assignments and studies leaves the student behind in his work. As grading time approaches, the student pleads with teachers for small favors and crams for his final tests in hopes of receiving a good grade. How much does a student learn cramming for final tests? Understanding the basic concepts and fundamentals of a course, which is the actual basis of education, is not attained in this manner.

A student of this type cares not of the knowledge he could gain, but rather wants to impress friends, satisfy parents, or gain the privileges of a passcard. Courses are taken because they are less difficult gradewise. Over emphasis of grades to meet these ends makes a mockery of the true

goals of education.

To these individuals, grades are demoted to the rank of insignificance; in no way can grades accurately evaluate the student's ability to learn, the amount of knowledge actually gained, or willingness to learn under these circumstances. The grade itself is more important to these students than the education it should represent.

Some people would do away with grades in order to alleviate these problems. Surely, grades are imperfect. Yet grades, if properly calculated through the student's ability and willingness to learn, are very indicative of the quality of a student's education. It is each student's responsibility to see that his grades are an accurate and precise measurement of his education. Only through a student's sincerity in his work can the maltreatment of grades be alleviated and true meaning of grades be recognized.

Redfield JV and Novice Invitaional Debate Tournament was ield on March 3. Rita Silins placed first in humorous impromptu and second in oratory.



Vicki and Twila entered in the two-man switch-side debate. Twila also entered oral interpretation.



### Cagers Top Sisseton, Bobcats, Capture Second In Section 1A

Flandreau

Redfield's Golden Pheasants finished the season on a disappointing note as they dropped a 75-45 decision to the streak-shooting Flandreau Indians in the championship game of the Section I Tourney at Brookings March 7. pionship by downing Watertown.

The torrid-shooting Indians held wide leads throughout the game and led 30-14 at half time as the Pheasants couldn't get untracked. The Indians widened that margin to 52-29 after the third quarter.

Flandreau shot a flaming 57 percent for the game while Redfield managed only a frigid 31 percent. Redfield outrebounded Flandreau by a 31-29 margin but committed 21 turnovers to 15 for the Indians. Daryl Jungwirth was the only double figure scorer with 12. He also garnered 10 rebounds.

Brookings

With fifteen second remaining Randy Bush calmly sank two free throws to propel the Redfield Pheasants into the chapionship game of the Section I Tournament at Brookings. The Pheasants defeated the Brookings Bobcats 64-63 in the contest.

The Pheasants never led in the game until only fifteen seconds remained. Brookings held quarter leads of 19-13, 33-28, and 53-41. With 4:39 remaining, the Pheasants initiated a great comeback surge which erased a 12 point Bobcat lead. The comeback was led by reserve Bush, Kevin Gaulrapp, and Rich Jankord. Brookings missed two field goal attempts and a 1-and-1 free throw attempt in the last fourteen seconds of the game.

Daryl Jungwirth led the Pheasant scoring with 15 counters. Reed Siegling and Randy Swedeen had fourteen and eleven points, respectively. Steve Jones popped in eight points, while Denis Guenthner, Bush, Gaulrapp, and Jankord each netted four points apiece, with most of these points coming in the final crucial minutes. Jungwirth and Jones each snared nine caroms as the Pheasants were outrebounded by a slim 30-28 margin.

Redfield shot a respectable 44 percent from the field while Brookings hit a warm 52 percent. The Pheasants won the game at the free throw line, hitting 14 of 16 shots. Brookings committed 24 turnovers to Redfield's 22.

Sisseton

Redfield's Golden Pheasants finished regular season play with a 59-58 victory over the Sisseton Redmen at Redfield March 2. The Pheasants finished loop play in a tie for third place with Milbank and attained a 10-10 overall regular season slate.

Redfield turned in its second consecutive fine game in a row in downing Sisseton. The Pheasants hit a sizzling 50% from the field while holding the Redmen to a cool 35%. Turnovers were even in the game, 13-13; but Redfield controlled the boards to the tune of a 30-22 margin.

The game was close all the way with neither team able to open up more than a four or five point lead. Sisseton led 13-12 after the first quarter, but Redfield battled back to lead 30-29 at the half. The Pheasants maintained the same one point margin to hold a 45-44 lead after the third stanza. The



### Blind Gymnast Performs With Family For High School Students At Assembly

Eddie Motter, a blind gymnast, performed for a high school assembly on February 27. Mr. Motter and his wife, Keturah, as well as their son, Harry, exhibited various feats of balance.

Mr. Motter lost the sight of his right eye in a freak accident at the age of six. He was playing with a sharp stick when he threw it at a tree and the stick ricocheted and hit him in the eye, rendering it sightless. He retained the sight of his left eye until he was ten. It was then that another tragic accident marred his left eye, leaving him totally blind. He was playing with a bocket knife when it slipped and struck him in the eye.

Eddie Motter was torn in Oklahoma and raised in Kansas City. After his unfortunate pair of accidents, he entered the St. Louis School for the Blind. Eddie Motter and his brother then chose to move to California and settled in the Los Angeles area. Here, Mr. Motter finished high school in a public school. He attended a braille home room available to blind students.

After Eddie Motter got his high school diploma he entered UCLA. He made it through school by taking notes in braille and hiring fellow students to read to him. He explained that his testing was done either on the typewriter or through oral questioning.

It was in California that Eddie Motter was introduced to gymnastics. He and his brother got into gymnastics when they were at the beach and observed a man instructing young people to do feats. This man turned out to be the gymnastics coach at UCLA. So when Eddie entered the college, he joined the team and with the help of the coach was able to develop himself into a fine athlete. He competed on the UCLA inter-scholastic team. Mr. Motter majored in sociology at the university and n.inored in psychology.

He got his degree and proceeded to team with his brother and began doing acts for money. His brother decided to quit. Mr. Motter also chose to leave show business because he felt he was using his talent in the wrong way by drawing people into night clubs where he performed. He expressed a deep conviction against drinking and smoking and advocated physical fitness. Mr. Motter was getting \$175 for a seven and a half minute act when he left show business.

Presently Mr. Motter, his wife, Keturah, son, Harry, and daughter, Anita, travel throughout North and South Dakota, Eastern Montana, and Northern Nebraska doing assembly programs. He is scheduled through the State University in Fargo, North Dakota.
