Steve Betten, Rick Welke, Randy Bentz, and Scott Dawson will attend the June session as delegates; and Andy Dickhaut, Bob Nuhsbaumer, Steve Marlette, and Steve Jones were named as alternates.

To be eligible for Boys State, the junior boys must be in the top third of their class. The selection was made on a different basis this year as the faculty and administration took no part. The selection was made entirely by the American Legion Post.

Gerald Nuhsbaumer nabbed the highest Redfield rating in the poultry division. No point totals were kept in the auto mechanics division. FFA'ers who participated in this event were Scott Moore, Brian Maher, Kevin Schurch, Marlin Schmidt, and Paul Lemmer.

Future Farmers of America RHS judging team placed fourth in the over-all judging held at Mitchell March 10. Approximately twenty-five other schools also competed in the events.

The Redfield team placed fourth in the livestock division, sixth in the crops division, and fourth in the over-all sweepstakes. Those making the trip to Mitchell were Bob Hardie, Bob Robinson, Jon Galvin, Tony Solheim, Mark Muellenberg, and Jerry Levtzow. Doug Fink, Dennis Becker, Joel Haber, Rick Van Vleet, Dave Jessen, and Dave Jungwirth also attended.

Levtzow. gained a tie for first place at the finish of the livestock judging contest but had to settle for second place honors on the basis of his reasons given during the contests. Levtzow scored 290 of a possible 300 points.



Coach Lonnie Scriver's Golden Pheasant cagers completed their season at the Section 1A Tournament held in Brookings March 6-7. Redfield finished second in the tournament to the Flandreau Indians.

Four seniors and seven juniors have been named letter winners by Coach Scriver. The senior lettermen are Kevin Gaulrapp. Randy Bush, Daryl Jungwirth, and Randy Swedeen. Rich Jankord, Denis Guenthner, Steve Jones, Reed Siegling, Dana Coats, Tim Esser, and Steve Marlette earned letters this year as juniors.

The Pheasants' season record finished at the .500 mark with an 11-11 won-loss record. Redfield tied for third in the NEC with Milbank with an 8-6 conference mark.

"B" team basketball coach Sam Willits guided the 1972-1973 "B" team Chicks to an 8-10 record this season. The Chicks were 6-8


against NEC opponents and 2-2 against non-conference opponents which were Faulkton, Mobridge, Watertown, and Miller,




