Kevin Boschee, in all his successful races in track, has finally been beaten in the race to the altar by Marla Schmidt.

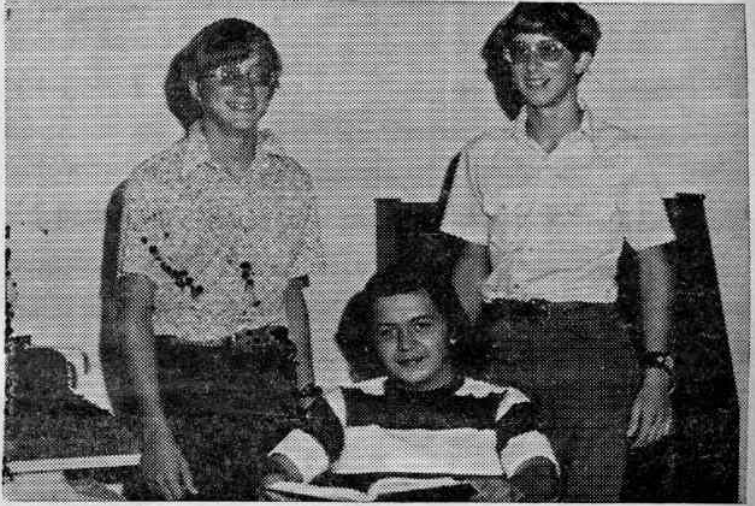

After a brief amateur career Dave Dorsey has broken into the P. G. A. Tour, aided by his devoted caddy Paula Pankratz.

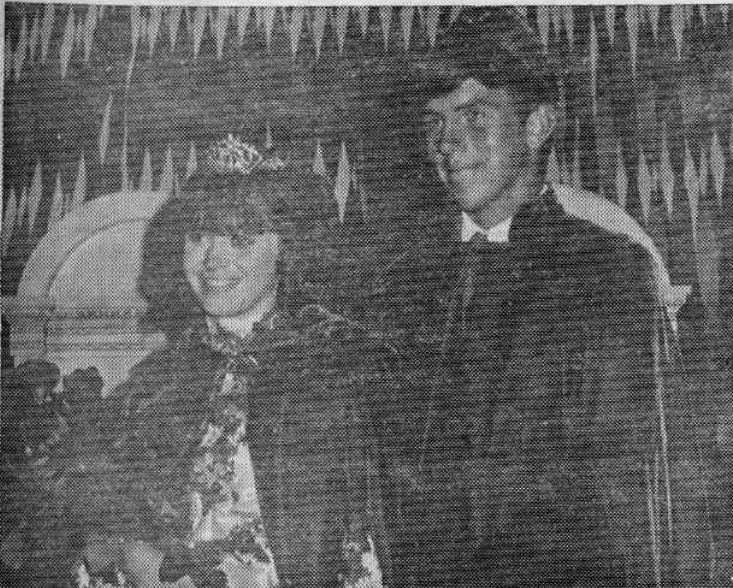
Nick Rude has inherited his father's Transportation Company. Head mechanics for the firm are Scott Moore and Kevin Schurch.

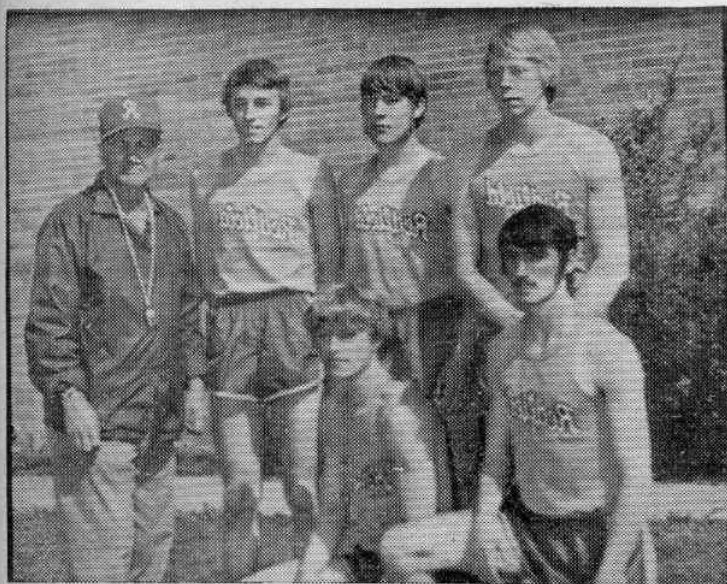
