

The win gave the Redfield gridders a Northeast Conference mark of three victories, two defeats and a tie and a season's record of three victories, four defeats and a tie. Redfield is tied with Roncalli for third place in the conference standings and the team still has a chance to tie for

second place.

In other Northeast Conference games played last weekend, Clark clinched the conference championship with a 12-6 victory over a stubborn Groton team; Britton rolled over Roncalli 27-6; and Milbank defeated Sisseton 26-

The first half of the Redfield-Webster game was a see-saw thriller Webster received the opening kickoff and moved for opening kickoff and moved for one first down before being forced to punt. The Bearcats got the ball back in good field position when they recovered a Redfield fumble on the Pheasants' third running play. 
